The palatial Forum residence promises to be built according to the following specifications:

A \$5,000 five or six room frame

Special "bees", such as a "digging bee," will be held when all members will work toward mass production. Payment for the hire of the architect, electrician and other skilled laborers will be made out of the money received from the sale of the home.
