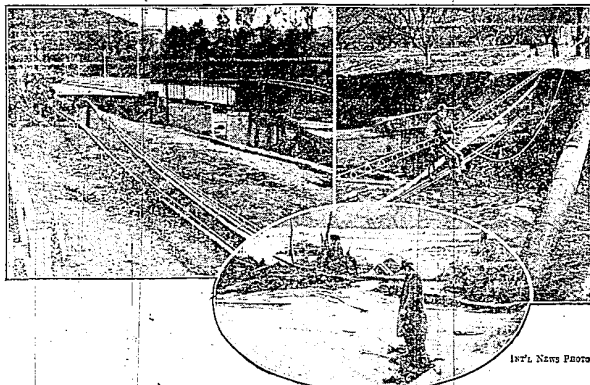

### PASTOR "ROUNDS UP" FLOCK BY TELEPHONE

Members of Congregation Respond to Personal Invitation to Home-coming Service

A telephone "round-up" of the members of his congregation was undertaken a short time ago by the Rev. G. Merrill Lenox, Pastor of the Judson Memorial Baptist Church in Minneapolis, in arranging for the annual Home-coming service.

Talks With Almost Every Family On previous similar occasions, Dr. Lenox had written circular letters to his parishioners, and had even added, upon occasion, personal postscripts. This time he tried something entirely different. He called by telephone every home represented in the membership of the church of approximately 1,000 people, inviting each member of the church to the service.

There were, of course, some families who did not have telephones, and in other cases he had to call several times on different days before getting a response. But he found it possible to converse for a few minutes with some member of almost every family connected with the church.

Many Benefits Resulted From Calls

The main object of the call was to urge every member of the family to come to the Home-coming service the following Sunday. The experiment worked: the congregation on that day was large and responsive. Some who were to be out of town that Sunday acknowledged their appreciation of the special personal invitation and came at their first opportunity.

"The telephoning project developed into vastly more than a promotion campaign for church attendance," the Rev. Dr. Lenox reported. "Opportunities presented themselves for discussing with people their personal problems. Reasons were discovered for the apparent indifference of some of the members of the church. And considerable practical information was secured which has helped the pastor to an amazing degree in his pastoral ministrations."

Opened Way for Personal Visits

These telephone calls also opened the way for personal visits, the need for which the pastor might not have learned in other ways, and helped him to gain other useful information. He feels that the results of the telephone calls were worth far more than the amount of time spent on them, and plans to repeat the "round-up" at a later time.

### Chinese in Olden Days

In olden days the Chinese held all other peoples in contempt. A part of the famous letter sent the British king by the Chinese emperor in the year 1793 followed: "You O King live beyond the confines of many seas; nevertheless, impelled by your humble desire to partake of the benefits of our humble civilization, you have dispatched a mission respect-fully beseeching your memorial: . . . the earnest terms in which it is couched reveal a respectful humility on your part which is highly praiseworthy. . . and then went on to state that the request was refused and that the English may, perhaps, "by perpetual submission to our throne" secure peace and prosperity even as the Chinese.

### Ligurians Settled in Genoa

The origin of Genoa, like that of many other towns founded before the Christian era, is lost in the remotest ages. According to tradition, the Ligurians gave up pastoral life and came down to the sea, populating its coasts and forming the first nucleus whence originated the town, which afterward dominated the Mediterranean. Later the Ligurians came in touch with the Greeks and the Phoenicians, with the Etruscans and the Carthaginians, and greatly increased their commercial and naval power.

### H. O. L. C. CHECKS RECORD AFTER 5 YEARS OF SERVICE

With more than 750,000 borrowers making satisfactory payments—borrowers who a few years ago were faced with the almost certain loss of their homes—the Home Owners' Loan Corporation reaches its fifth anniversary June 6 with a great part of its work accomplished.

Looking back to the troubled days when the HOLC granted its loans, when the average borrower was two years delinquent in both principal and interest on his then existing mortgage and far in arrears in taxes, General Manager Charles A. Jones revealed records which show three-fourths of the million harassed persons who sought aid are on the road to debt-free home ownership. More than 100,000 others still are being aided in their struggle, while more than 30,000 already have paid their loans in full.

Revealing that HOLC borrowers already have paid back \$35,358,705, or 12.6 per cent of their principal indebtedness, Mr. Jones declared collections had been "remarkable" even in recent months. In March they were 97.5 per cent of billings; in April, they dropped to 87 per cent, but figures for May, still incomplete, show another upswing.

### Distressed People

"It is true that the Corporation has acquired about \$5,000 homes," said Mr. Jones, "and it will be forced to take over more. But the million loans granted by HOLC were to distressed people. Their plight did not end with the day their loans were granted; many of them have struggled for years for a normal living and many of them lost their fight."

"Out of those million persons whose homes the HOLC salvaged, about 620,000 today are either entirely current or less than three months in arrears. About 138,000 more are meeting all current bills and making regular monthly payments on their arrearages in addition. For more than 100,000 others still have a chance to save their homes. There were, of course, thousands who just couldn't make the grade—and some who wanted something for nothing."

Mr. Jones stressed that thousands of the borrowers saved by HOLC were salvaged because of the leniency which such an agency could grant and the aid which it was able to give. Foreclosures have not been made nor will they be, he asserted, where a borrower has a chance to save his home. The average HOLC foreclosure came only after borrowers were 20 months delinquent in both principal and interest, with a piling up to a point where the Corporation, in protection of bond holders and taxpayers, was forced to act.

### Facts About the Telephone

The first telephone switchboard in Baltimore was placed in service on January 1, 1879.

About \$5,000,000 is being expended in providing new long distance cable circuits throughout Scotland.

Russia and New Zealand are now the only large countries to which transoceanic telephone service is not available from this country.

The longest greeting by telephone last Christmas to a point in the United States traveled by wire and radio some 11,000 miles from Johannesburg, South Africa, to Chicago.

## New Telephone Switchboard To Be Placed In Service June 21

TO FURTHER improve telephone service for our Farmington customers, a new telephone switchboard will be placed in service at 9 p. m. next Tuesday, June 21, in our new office at 23614 Farmington Road.

Among the service features of the new switchboard is the "Audible Ringing Signal," which indicates when the called telephone is being rung. This signal is an intermittent "burr-r-r-ring" sound which you will hear after you have given the operator the number you wish to call. If no answer is obtained after you have heard this ringing signal repeated for about two minutes, it is probable that no one is near the called telephone. In that case, it is suggested that you hang up the receiver and call again later.

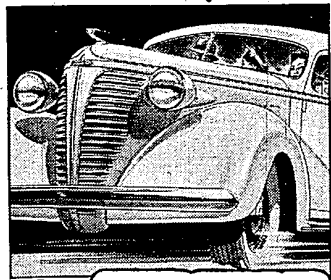
