The baby was rushed to an incubator at the Detroit Osteopathic Hospital, where he died early Tuesday morning.

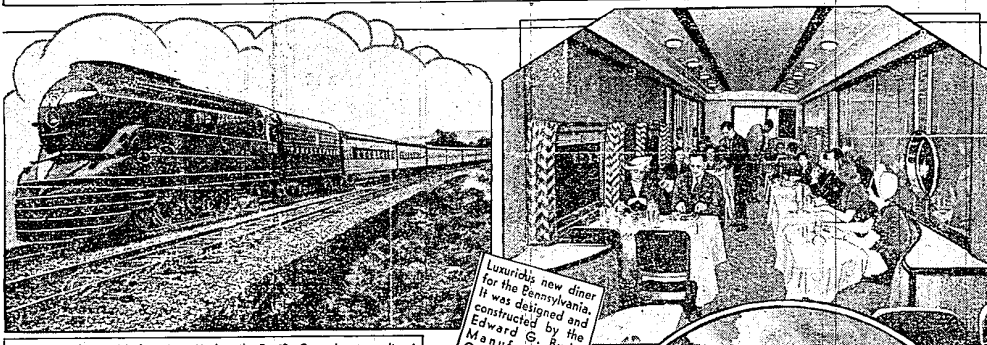

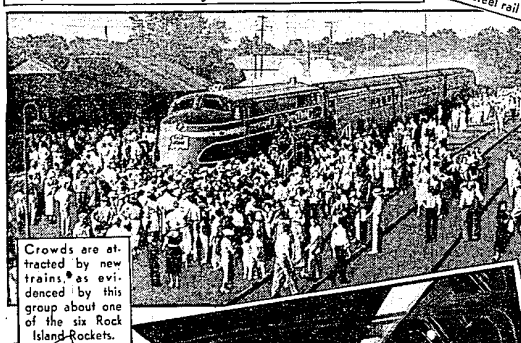

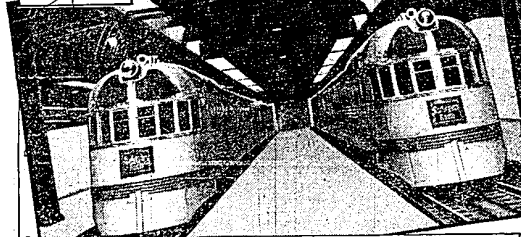
Streamlined Train Service NOW SPANS COUNTRY



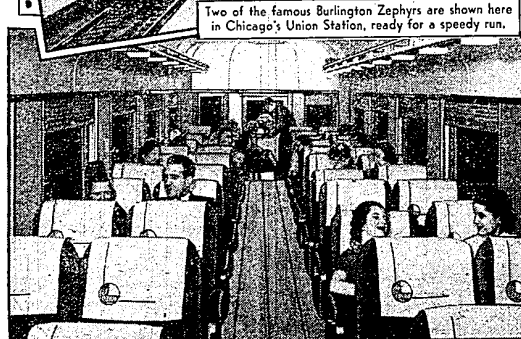

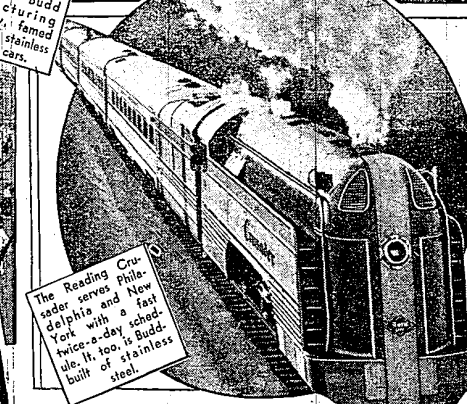
Crowds are attracted by new trains, as evidenced by this group about one of the six Rock Island Rockets.
