New Wagering Gimmick Has 'Em Boxing At HP

There's a new fad these days at the Hazel Park Race Track... "boxing" or "wheeling" the trifecta.

The aficionado's fondness for this betting gimmick helps explain why Hazel Park is off to such a strong start in its current meeting which will continue through Saturday, Dec. 18.

The trifecta, of course, is the latest wrinkle in novelty betting. A student undertakes to name the one-two-three finish in a race in the exact order of finish. This system is currently the rage of France, and is enjoying increasing popularity in New York.

Trifecta betting is offered on the third race and on the last race. When ordering a trifecta ticket, a patron should say: "Third race (or the last race) 4-5-8 (or whatever numbers he wants)". The seller then punches a single

ticket which has the six combinations.

This system greatly facilitates the selling of tickets, and guards against confusion and errors.

Hazel Park also offers the traditional daily double on the first two races, a quinnella (name the first two in either order) on the fifth race and a perfecta (name the first two in the correct order) on the seventh race.

The feature on the big 10 race card Saturday (Aug. 14) will be The \$15,000 Executive Handicap for three year olds and upward at one mile.

12-Pound Bass Tale Just A Big 'Fish Story'

The celebrated 12-pound black bass of Oakland County is a hoax--or at least a "fish story."

So says Ron Spitzer, Pontiac district fisheries expert for the state Dept. of Natural Resources, who this week said he's "convinced that the fish never existed."

No certification was made, no witness could be found, and the fish was never seen, said Spitzer.

TWO WEEKS ago, the DNR's newsletter for southeastern Michigan reported that one Gerald Blocker of Ann Arbor caught a black of 12 pounds, one ounce in an unnamed Oakland County lake.

The state DNR publicist picked up the story and circulated it to all Michigan newspapers, quoting Blocker about the fish's furious battle and relating how Blocker at first thought he had hooked a catfish.
