### STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT HAS

The state highway department began a new fiscal year with a statement budget. At the close of the last fiscal year ending June 30, the Department had a balance of \$1,322,000. This compares with a balance of \$3,099,355 remaining at the end of the previous fiscal year.


