The popularity of these clubs arises from the fact that they enable individuals and families easily to finance a trip to the Fair next year through gradual accumulation of the necessary funds instead of by single demand upon financial resources.

The slogan of the plan is "Save Today to See the World of Tomorrow."

STATE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT HAS BALANCED BUDGET

The state highway department had a new fiscal year with a balanced budget.

At the close of the last fiscal year ending June 30, the Department had a balance of \$1,282,000. This compares with a balance of \$3,099,355 remaining at the end of the previous fiscal year.

The financial condition of the Department carries out a persistent pledge of State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wageningen to keep the books of the Department in the black.

A balanced budget was achieved despite the fact that the Department received only half, or \$1,750,000 of its supplementary general fund appropriation for the fiscal year. To balance its budget, the Department was required to make extensive payroll reductions and to curtail its maintenance program.

Sizeable Balance

Pointing out that a sizeable balance is needed to meet increasing obligations, Department authorities did not look upon the fiscal year end condition with undue optimism. They pointed out that a balance of approximately \$3,000,000 must be met before the end of the calendar year on the sinking fund obligation in connection with the \$50,000,000 highway bond issue of 1919 and that payments approximating \$600,000 will be required.
