

## Annual School Report

OF SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 9, SOUTHFIELD TOWNSHIP

Annual meeting of the School Board of Southfield School District No. 9, held at the John Grace School, Monday, July 11, 1938. The following members answered roll call: Rolland Charpentier, president; Joseph W. Doe, secretary; William Harrison, treasurer; Otto Esler, trustee; and Ollie Kallman, trustee.

Meeting called to order at 8:20 P. M. with President Rolland Charpentier at the chair.

Minutes of the last annual meeting and special meetings were read and approved.

The financial report was read.

Motion by Mrs. Hardow supported by Mr. Thomas that the report be accepted. Carried.

New business was now in order.

Nominations were in order for a trustee for a term of three years.

Mr. William Harrison's term expiring.

Those nominated were Mr. Howard Kennedy, Mrs. Eva Tesch, and Mr. Oscar Mullen. Motion by Mr. Perry, supported by Mrs. Thomas that nominations close. Carried.

The eligibility of Mr. Kennedy was questioned. After some discussion it was decided to leave his name in.

Mr. Richard Thomas and Mr. Clara Richards were appointed tellers.

Balances were passed and collected with the following results: Votes cast 73; Mrs. Tesch, 28; Mr. Mullen, 27 and Mr. Kennedy, 20.

Mrs. Tesch was duly elected a trustee for a period of three years.

At this time Mr. Joseph W. Doe presented the board with his resignation stating that it has immediate effect.

Motion by Mrs. Hardow, supported by Mrs. Thomas, that a short recess be taken to permit the school board to adjourn to another part of the building to act on the resignation. Carried.

A short time later the school board returned and informed the assembly that the resignation had been accepted.

Nominations were now in order for a trustee to fill the vacancy. Mr. Mullen and Mr. Thomas were nominated.

Motion made by Mrs. Tesch, supported by Mrs. Oakland that nominations close. Carried.

Mr. Clara Richards and W. C. Carpler were appointed tellers.

Balances were passed and collected with the following results: Votes cast, 68; Mullen, 44; Thomas, 16.

Mr. Oscar Mullen being duly elected a trustee for one year.

Motion by Mrs. Charpentier, supported by Mr. Cote, that the board's salaries remain the same. Carried.

Motion by Mrs. Tesch, supported by Mr. Cote, that the Detroit Bank, Redford Branch, act as depository for school funds. Carried.

Motion by Mrs. Tesch, supported by Mr. Cote, that the meeting adjourn. Carried.

### State To Issue Sales Tax Stickers August 1

The state's \$0,000 sales tax licenses will receive their 1938-39 return books and licenses by August 1, it was stated recently by Draper Allen, Managing Director of the State Board of Tax Administration. The books are printed and addressed and stored in the Lansing post office.

Until August 1 the department will recognize the 1937-38 license sticker now in place on store windows and doors. After that date the 1938-39 sticker must be displayed.

In previous years the return books were mailed out daily as they were ready and some confusion occurred. This year every taxpayer will receive his book and sticker at the same time and Allen requested that licensees wait until the August 1 deadline is passed before inquiring about non-reception of licenses.

The department will not issue licenses unless the taxpayer forwards the license application fee of \$1.00 together with the blue license application blank found in the 1937-38 return book, Allen stated.
