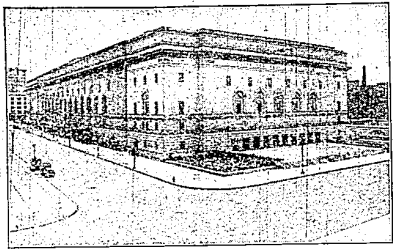


Where Seventh World's Poultry Congress Activities Will Center



From July 23 to August 7, 1939, Cleveland's mammoth Public Auditorium will become the Hall of Meetings for the Seventh World's Poultry Congress and Exposition. At the center of the great group of buildings that will house the world's largest industrial exposition, this huge hall will accommodate the scientific and sectional meetings of the World's Poultry Science Association. These meetings, at which English, French, Spanish and German will be the official languages, will attract poultry scientists from every corner of the world. Here, too, official delegations from at least sixty overseas nations will have their headquarters. Here will be a continuous and interlocking schedule of meetings dealing with every phase of the poultry industry—meetings for the poultry raiser, dealing with poultry culture and marketing, meetings for the processor, the handler and marketer of poultry products—and meetings for the consumer with demonstrations illustrating new and economical ways of preparing poultry for consumption. For a busy eleven days this Hall of Meetings will be the center of interest for a host of a half million or more poultry folk and the "Mecca" toward which worldwide poultrydom will turn its eyes. By securing a membership ticket for \$1.00 the public may attend for eleven days with no additional expense.

SOFT BALL TEAM SCHEDULES TWO GAMES NEXT WEEK

Two softball games are on the schedule for next week for the Farmington team, according to the manager, Harvey Hamilton, and two more may be added within the next few days. A game is also listed for Friday of this week.

The locals will attempt to avenge a defeat handed them by this team in Northville last Friday. The score of that game was 6 to 4. Harvey Hamilton, who has proven himself the ace pitcher on the team, will pitch.

Troy Laundry of Detroit Monday night will make their second appearance of the summer at the local field in the third clash of the season between the Farmington team and Troy. Farmington possesses one victory and one tie was played. Hamilton's charges won handily 11 to 4 in the first game of the series, but Monday night they were held to a seven inning 3 to 3 tie by the Troy team. The game was called because of darkness.

Parker Subdivision's Haymakers will attempt to make a better showing when they meet Farmington's representatives on the Park or Field Tuesday night, which they did last week. Hamilton is trying to schedule games also for Wednesday and Thursday.

League Playoffs

Softball league playoffs will be played during the Northville Wayne County Fair, which is being held from August 17 to 20, the local team was informed this week.

Farmington showed up impressively as they won two games and tied a third. They won Tuesday night by showing superior batting prowess, defeating Parker's Haymakers, 11 to 3. Sam Parker was the winning pitcher.

Harvey Hamilton allowed only three hits Wednesday night to upset Novi in a close contest, 2 to 0. He also pitched in Monday night's 3 to 3 tie.

Elmer Cathers is the team's most consistent pitcher. His average is slightly below the .500 mark and most of his safe hits are chalked up following his now famous bunts.

Two Guernseys Set New Milk, Butter Fat Marks

Two Farmington men are boasting of new records established by their Guernsey cows for age and class.

A two year old cow, Cesar Caron's La Noce, owned by Charles E. Svensen set a record of 11,194.3 pounds of milk and 573.8 pounds of butter fat.

Rose Mary of Meesta County Farm, a three year old Guernsey, owned by F. L. Dunn, established an official record of 9,161.6 pounds of milk and 412.1 pounds of butter fat.

Both tests were under the supervision of Michigan State College, and records were announced by the American Guernsey Cattle Club.

Part of the big show, the 1939 Golden Gate International Exposition, on Treasure Island in San Francisco Bay, will be the \$77,000,000 San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge and the \$35,000,000 structure which spans the Golden Gate.
