The decision of Leon D. Case, Secretary of State, to use metal license plates, instead of windsheld stickers that were made outside the state, has met with universal approval.

Sales for the period ending June 29, 1938, of half year plates have reached 597,693 units as compared to the sale of 437,924 "windsheld stickers for the same period last year, or an increase in half year licenses of 159,765 units or approximately 40 per cent.
