

Patients Stay Home, Cancer Study Shows

Cancer patients do not seek treatment away from their usual residences in demonstrably greater numbers than victims of other diseases, according to a special

U. S. Census—Bureau study of cancer deaths made public by Director William L. Austin, Jr. treatment is sought elsewhere, the report states, the patients are usually returned to their place of residence prior to death. In 1935 there were 137,619 deaths reported due to cancer. Of these, 17,022 were deaths of persons who died in a city or county in which they did not have their regular residence. These 17,022 non-resident deaths comprised 12.4 percent of all cancer deaths. Of the 1,392,732 deaths occurring in 1925 from all causes, 156,068 or 11.2 percent were non-residents.

Infant Deaths At New Low, Reports Indicate

The national infant mortality rate of 54.4 deaths under one year for each 1,000 estimated live births for 1937 was the lowest in the history of the U. S. Bureau of the Census. The birth registration area, which was established in 1915, according to preliminary figures made public by Director William L. Austin. These reports indicate there were 119,760 infant deaths in 1937 compared with 122,538 in 1936. This saving of 2,778 lives reduced the infant death rate from 57.1 in 1936 to the new low of 54.4 for last year.

The decline in the infant mortality rate was accompanied by a slight decrease in the total United States death rate from 11.5 deaths per 1,000 estimated population in 1936 to 11.2 in 1937, according to preliminary tabulations. Registered deaths in 1937 totaled 4,150,715, compared with 4,172,228 in 1936. The total death rate has declined approximately 36 percent during the 38 year period that the Census Bureau has compiled annual mortality statistics.

The United States birth rate for 1937 advanced slightly over the rate for 1936, preliminary figures indicate. The 1937 rate of 17.0 births for each 1,000 estimated population is an increase of 0.3 over the rate of 16.7 for 1936.
