**LOW RENT HOUSING PROJECTS LEASED TO COMMISSION**

The United States Government's two large low-rent housing projects in Detroit, Michigan, were formally leased recently to the Detroit Housing Commission by Leon H. H. Acting Administrator of the United States Housing Authority. The tenants will begin moving into the projects on September 15, according to present plans.

Paradise built at cost of \$4,500,000 provides 775 decent homes for low income white families. Brewster, a \$5,200,000 slum-clearing project, provides 701 dwellings for Negro families. The initial lease becomes effective when the buildings are ready for occupancy and terminates June 30, 1940. The annual rental which the local authority will pay the United States Housing Authority for both projects is \$1,706 per year.

The lease stipulates a schedule of rents in which the cost of shelter alone averages \$5.07 per room per month for Paradise and \$4.52 per room per month in Brewster.

**Monthly Rentals**

In Paradise, the monthly gross dwelling rentals, including heat, hot water and electricity for lighting, cooking and refrigeration, are as follows:

In Brewster, the monthly gross dwelling rentals, including the same facilities, are as follows:

In each project the living-bedroom apartments include kitchen, dining space and a bathroom. The 1, 2 and 3 bedroom apartments each have separate living rooms.

**21 Acres**

Paradise was built on a vacant site of more than 21 acres, while Brewster stands on a 27-acre site which formerly was one of the worst crime and disease ridden slum areas in Detroit. Both developments consist of 3-story apartments, 2-story group houses and 2-story flats.

Fifty-seven fireproof buildings make up the Paradise project, while Brewster consists of 35 fire-resistant structures.

Both projects are provided with ample play areas for children and lawns, walks and drives for recreation and pleasure of the tenants. Each dwelling is equipped with an electric range and an electric refrigerator. Laundries are available to tenants. There are also a number of facilities for meeting rooms and recreation quarters for tenants.

**Wagner-Steagall Act**

Under the Wagner-Steagall Act, families whose incomes exceed five times the dwelling rentals are not eligible to become tenants, except where there are three or more minor dependents. In such cases the ratio of income to rent may be six to one. The low-rent dwellings are available only to families living in substandard housing and who are unable to provide safe and sanitary homes within their means.

The Wagner-Steagall Act directs that existing Government housing projects built by the Public Works Administration, rehousing program in recent years and transferred to the United States Housing Authority shall be disposed of to local communities either through sale or lease as expeditiously as possible. Others already leased are three projects in Chicago, two each in New York, Louisville, Kentucky and Memphis, Tennessee, and one each in Boston, Birmingham, Alabama, Cambridge, Massachusetts, Columbia, South Carolina, Cincinnati, Ohio, Lackawanna, New York, Lexington, Kentucky, Omaha, Nebraska, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and Toledo, Ohio.
