SIDEWALKS ALONG RURAL TRUNKLINES RECEIVE SUPPORT

Support for policies of sidewalk construction along rural trunklines and construction of three-lane pavements was found this week by the state highway department in reports from the highway planning survey.

Studies of fatal accidents on rural trunklines over a three-year period indicate that pedestrian accidents predominate on rural trunklines within a three-mile radius of metropolitan centers. State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagoner pointed out that sidewalk construction in these areas would eliminate many pedestrian accidents. The department has already constructed short sections of sidewalk along heavily traveled roads leading out of Grand Rapids, Flint and other cities.

Test Sections Three-lane highways were shown to have a low accident rate per million vehicle miles than either two-lane or four-lane undivided roads. A study of accidents during 1936 on 75 "test sections" of rural highway, shows a rate of 1.87 accidents per million vehicle miles on two-lane highways while the rate for four-lane roads was 1.51 and for three-lane roads 1.32.

"This indicates that our policy of widening such highways as US-16 and US-12 to three lanes is a wise one from a safety standpoint," the commissioner said. "Apparently we should continue our policy of widening by stages going from two to three lanes wherever possible."

AMENDED VEHICLE LAW SAVES STATE FARMERS MONEY

Approximately \$250,000 were saved to the farmers of Michigan this year as a result of the enactment of an amendment to the Motor Vehicle Law by the 1937 Session of the State Legislature.

The amendment to the act reduced the license fee on vehicles used exclusively for farm use to a flat rate of fifty cents per hundred. Prior to this year all farm trucks were assessed the regular fee charged to commercial trucks, the price range of which was from \$65 to \$125 per hundred.

The amendment was urged upon the legislature by the Secretary of State as a just concession to the farmers of Michigan whose vehicles are used almost entirely on the farm and used on the highways only incidental to their real use. This amended fee schedule applies also to hearses and ambulances.

The 1938 license plates for farm trucks will have inscribed on them the words, "Farm Comm." To afford protection to the State against any attempts at abuse of the provisions of the amended act.

License plates for all motor vehicles may now be purchased at half price and may be used until March 1, 1939.
