LARGE STOP SIGNS INSTALLED ON FARMINGTON ROAD

Motorists who drive down Farmington Road should have no excuse in the future for failing to stop at Base Line Road, for the State Highway Department recently installed two large stop signs at that intersection, where two serious accidents recently occurred.

For the safety of motorists who travel down the Eight Mile Road, who are not compelled to stop at the Farmington Road intersection, and to permit motorists who drive on Farmington Road plenty of time to know that they have to stop for that intersection, extra large stop signs with reflectors have been erected. The signs are the largest in this area, and are of the new type that may be used in the near future at all street stops on the State highways. The sign measures approximately 18 inches in width and 18 inches in depth, and can be seen for a long distance, both during the day time and the night time.

Two accidents occurred at that intersection within five days during the latter part of August. One victim, a 57-year-old Oxford woman, died as a result of injuries received when a car in which she was riding collided with a truck. Another Oxford woman was seriously injured and the driver was treated for injuries at the Redford Receiving Hospital.

The second accident, which occurred August 29, resulted in two badly smashed cars, one of which was reported to have rolled over twice. A 57-year-old Royal Oak man was treated by a Farmington physician for injuries.

New Sign Is Called Unique By Travelers

People are commenting daily on the scenic sign which has been erected at White's Service Station on Grand River avenue. School children cross the street to get a closer view, and travelers who stop to view it, call the sign unique, according to Manager Bill White.
