Conservation Board Approves Sanctuaries

Included among lands approved by the state conservation commission for a renewal of dedication as wildlife sanctuaries are 1,007 acres in Leslie and Onondaga townships in Ingham county. Application for a 10-year renewal of the dedication was made by Judge Arthur J. Tuttle and Mrs. Grace Tuttle Annis, of Detroit.

Three other renewals, each for five years, also were granted. To Dr. Frank N. Wilson of Ann Arbor on 188 acres in White Oak township, Ingham county; to H. J. Parker, Boyne City, on 120 acres in Wilton township, Charlevoix county; and to John Hemma, of Onondaga, for 70 acres in Onondaga township, Ingham county.

NOW IS THE TIME TO GET YOUR FISHING DONE

If you are a hardy soul who likes fishing, well enough to brave autumn's chill winds, this is the time of year when your chances are good for bringing in the best catches of the season.
October is usually the best fishing month of the year, due chiefly to two factors.
The lower temperatures which come during this month in a normal season stimulate activity in the fish world. The same fish, which, like humans, are inclined to take it easy and loaf around a bit during the heat of the summer, get renewed pep as the water cools. They circulate around and are more inclined to show interest in bait dangled in their vicinity.

Matter of Appetite
The other factor relates to the matter of appetite. Since many species of fish, and especially bass, grow sluggish during winter temperatures and feed lightly, it is natural for them to eat voraciously now to build themselves up for the period of comparative dormancy and abstemiousness.

In general, October usually offers the year's best angling because it offers temperatures which are neither too warm, as they frequently are in the summer, nor too cold, as they are likely to be in the winter.
Bass fishing often is the most productive, but catches of pike, bluegill and perch also are usually heavier in October than earlier in the season.

Compensation Head Asks Employers' Cooperation

Extreme care on the part of employers in correctly transcribing the Social Security Account numbers of their employees, was urged today by Executive Director Abner E. Larson, of the Michigan Unemployment Compensation Commission.

"One misplaced figure in a Social Security Account number is enough to disqualify a worker from benefits," Mr. Larson said. "The first correct number causes the applicant to lose his identity, as far as the records are concerned."
"Careless transposition of digits in the number cause delay in processing a claim. It works untold injustice to the claimant. In some instances it deprives the unemployed applicant to funds when he most needs them."

Great delay has occurred in hundreds of instances. This delay is caused by the commission's control. For this reason we are asking the fullest cooperation of employers throughout the state."

32 DEGREES IS IDEAL FOR KEEPING APPLES

Experiments with storage facilities at Michigan State College show how to stretch out that period when a sizeable supply of apples in the fall is counted upon to offer the "apple a day" that "keeps the doctor away."
Keep them cool and in moist storage, advised Roy E. Marshall, fruit specialist at the college.
Proof is simple. Ideal keeping temperatures seem to be down around 32 to 35 degrees Fahrenheit. Raise the temperature to 40 degrees and the apples keep only half as long. Let the temperature go up to 50 degrees and the fruit spoils twice as fast as at 40, or four times as fast at 32 or 33 degrees. At 55 degrees the fruit will keep only one tenth as long a period.

85 Per Cent Water
Most fruits contain about 85 per cent water. The skin of the fruit is designed to reduce moisture loss, but in a dry atmosphere there is considerable wilting and shriveling of the fruit.

So a fruit cellar needs insulation from the dry heat of a basement furnace. Marshall also recommends keeping the storage floor moist to add to the humidity.

Using a window and night air ventilation is the most economical method of storing storage temperatures. By closing the window in the daytime during the fall, a low temperature is possible even in October. Faithful operation of this window should bring a holding temperature of 32 to 35 degrees in early December.
For an apartment dweller, Marshall suggests small purchases and refrigeration.

Of the other programs originating in the University studios, nine will go out over station WJR and five over station WMBD.

The skunks are digging neat little holes in search of white grubs. That part of their work may be beneficial, yet the skunks fail to replace the grubs.
