TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 8th, 1933

To the qualified Electors of Wayne County, Mich. Notice
is Hereby Given, that a General Election will be held in every
voting precinct in the Township of Livonia on

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS.
Notice is Hereby Further Given that at the time and places
of holding the General Election, there will be submitted at said
Election, Four Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the
State of Michigan, viz:

(Proposal No. 1)
Amendment to Provide for a Four-Year Term of Office for
County Clerk, Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, Treasurer and Reg-
ister of Deeds.

This amendment, if adopted, will provide for a four-year term
of office for the above-named officers, to take effect January
1, 1939.

(Proposal No. 2)
Amendment to Provide for the Non-Partisan Nomination and
Appointment of Supreme Court Justices for Eight-Year Terms.
This amendment, if adopted, will provide for the appoint-
ment of justices of the supreme court by the governor from names
submitted to him by the judicial commission, which commission
shall be composed of one supreme court justice, one circuit
judge, one probate court judge, three members of the state bar
and three electors of this state not licensed to practice law.

(Proposal No. 3)
Shall the Constitution be Amended to Guarantee That Gaso-
line and Motor Vehicle License Plate Taxes Paid by Motorists be
Used for Highways, Roads and Streets.
This amendment, if adopted, will require that all gasoline and
weight (license plate) taxes collected from motorists for highway
purposes continue to be used for such purposes. It does not apply
to any other taxes. It does not grant any additional taxing power
to the legislature, nor restrict its right to change the rates and
methods of allocation of such motor vehicle taxes.

(Proposal No. 4)
Referendum on Act No. 257 of the Public Acts of 1937, Being
an Act to Provide for the Transfer of the Administration of Cer-
tain Existing State Public Welfare and Relief Matters, Services
and Duties to the State Department of Public Assistance Created
by Said Act, and to Amend the Various State Departments,
Boards, Commissions, and Offices so Transferred.

RELATIVE TO OPENING AND CLOSING OF THE POLLS
No. 416, Laws Relating to Elections—Rev. of 1938

(416) Section 1. "One the day of any election the polls shall be
opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continued
open until six o'clock in the afternoon and no longer: PROVIDED
That in townships the board of inspectors of election may, in its
discretion, adjourn the polls at twelve o'clock noon, for one hour,
and that the township board in townships and the legislative body
in cities and villages may, by resolution, provide that the polls
shall be opened at six o'clock in the forenoon and may also provide
that the polls shall be kept open not later than eight o'clock in the
evening of the same day. Every qualified elector present and in
line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall
be allowed to vote.

(417) Section 2. Unless otherwise specified, the hours for the
opening and closing of polls and the conducting of elections, shall
be governed by EASTERN standard time.

THE POLLS of said election will be open at 7 o'clock a. m.
and will remain open until 8:00 o'clock p. m. of said day of
Election.

Lutheran Hour to Resume Oct. 23 on 62 Stations

The Lutheran Hour, featuring Dr.
Walter A. Maier of Concordia Sem-
inary, will return to the air Sunday
afternoon, October 23, for another
series of 25 broadcasts over a coast-
to-coast network of 62 stations of
the Mutual Broadcasting System.

The program will be broadcast
twice each Sunday afternoon,
due to the unavailability of
time on all stations at the
same hour. It will be heard at
1 p. m. Eastern Standard Time
over 15 Eastern stations, and at
3:30 Central Standard Time
over 49 Central and Western stations.

The eastern group includes
WAAB, Boston; WEAN, Prov-
idence; WSPR, Springfield, Mass.;
WTTT, Hartford; WISN, Mil-
waukee; WBAL, Baltimore; WCAB,
Pittsburgh; WKLB, Detroit; WHN,
Hendons; WVS, Cincinnati; and
WFIL, Philadelphia.

Broadcast from St. Louis
Originating at Station KFD, St.
Louis, the program will be heard
on the second broadcast from KWIK,
St. Louis; WISN, Milwaukee;
KSTP, St. Paul; KTV, Lincoln;
KFEL, Denver; WMT, Cedar
Rapids; KSD, Des Moines; WFL,
Chicago; KFTL, Bloomington, N. D.;
WIRE, Indianapolis; WRB, Kansas
City; WQVO, Fort Wayne; KGGF,
Cottleville, Kan.; KNS, Ft. Worth;
WRR, Dallas, and over six
stations of the Oklahoma Network
and the 27 stations of the Don Lee
Network, including Los Angeles, San
Francisco, and San Diego, Calif., and
Washington.

Resumption of the broadcasts
will also mark the return of the
Lutheran Hour Chorus, composed of
students of Concordia Seminary,
and the nationally-noted St. Louis
Tape Choir, a mixed chorus
of 50 voices.
A noted theologian, author and
lecturer, Dr. Maier has attracted
wide attention through his Luther-
an Hour broadcasts since their be-
ginning in 1928. He has been an
uncompromising advocate of the
divine origin of the Scriptures, and
a vigorous opponent of communism,
