PROPOSED AMENDMENTS Notice is Hereby Further Given that at the time and places of holding the General Election, there will be submitted at said Election, Four Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the State of Michigan, viz:

(Proposal No. 1) Amendment to Provide for a Four-Year Term of Office for County Clerk, Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, Treasurer and Register of Deeds. This amendment, if adopted, will provide for a four-year term of office for the above-named officers, to take effect January 1, 1939.

(Proposal No. 2) Amendment to Provide for the Non-Partisan Nomination and Appointment of Supreme Court Justices for Eight-Year Terms. This amendment, if adopted, will provide for the appointment of Justices of the supreme court by the governor from names submitted to him by the judicial commission, which commission shall be composed of one supreme court justice, one circuit judge, one probate court judge, three members of the state bar and three electors of this state not licensed to practice law.

(Proposal No. 3) Shall the Constitution be Amended to Guarantee That Gasoline and Motor Vehicle License Plate Taxes Paid by Motorists be Used for Highways, Roads and Streets.

Adoption of this amendment will require that all gasoline and weight (license plate) taxes collected from motorists for highway purposes continue to be used for such purposes. It does not apply to any other taxes. It does not grant any additional taxing power to the legislature, nor restrict its right to change the rates and methods of allocation of such motor vehicle taxes.

(Proposal No. 4) Referendum on Act No. 257 of the Public Acts of 1937, Being an Act to Provide for the Transfer or the Administration of Certain Existing State Public Welfare and Relief Matters, Services and Duties to the State Department of Public Assistance Created by Said Act, and to Abolish the Various State Departments, Boards, Commissions, and Offices so Transferred.

RELATIVE TO OPENING AND CLOSING OF THE POLLS

No. 416, Laws Relating to Elections-Rev. of 1938 (416) Section 1. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continued open until six o'clock in the afternoon and no longer: PROVIDED That in townships the board of inspectors of election may, in its discretion, adjourn the polls at twelve o'clock noon, for one hour, and that the township board in townships and the legislative body in cities and villages may, by resolution, provide that the polls shall be opened at six o'clock in the forenoon and may also provide that the polls shall be kept open not later than eight o'clock in the evening of the same day. Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

(417) Section 2. Unless otherwise specified, the hours for the opening and closing of polls and for the conducting of elections, shall be governed by EASTERN standard time. Judge Lynch Friend to Youth



As much a part of real life as death and taxes, yet as little noted by Mr. and Mrs. John Q. Kelly as everyday births, countless children in the real-life drama of Jack and Jill, or any boy and girl, who sin against society and become what to many are vaguely known as "juvenile delinquents." In Oakland County the stage for that drama is the Juvenile Court. For a period of one year beginning July 1, 1937, there were 360 individual characters involved—all of them younger than 17—who made up a total of 1,256 delinquent acts. At all them presided Probate and Juvenile Court Judge James H. Lynch. To Jack and Jill the Juvenile Court Judge at first appeared to be an austere, relentless individual, bent on dealing harshly and without heart. But they soon learned that Judge Lynch was the father of five children, and grandfather to four more. He seemed to understand the child in need of medical care, and unable to pay, shall go without aid.

MEDICAL ATTENTION GIVEN BY STATE TO 2,000 CHILDREN

According to figures released recently by the Auditor General George T. Gundry, nearly 2,000 afflicted children, unable to pay for hospitalization, received treatment in Michigan hospitals in September. Many of these patients were hospitalized at the University Hospital at Ann Arbor. The law provides that the Auditor General in cooperation with the Michigan Crippled Children Commission shall establish a fee schedule of rates and fees to be paid by the State to hospitals and physicians for the care and treatment of crippled and afflicted children unable to pay for themselves. The procedure followed by the parents of a child in need is: first, to make application to the Judge of Probate. From the probate Judge, the report is sent to the Auditor General's Department with recommendations for commitment to a hospital. Applications are daily received by Mr. Gundry's department where they are given careful consideration. Because the auditor General's duties in this matter are strictly prescribed by law, his activities are confined to the routine of careful audit.

In view of the improved business conditions of the past few months, and the good outlook for the future, Mr. Gundry expects the demands for free hospitalization to decrease, although, he says, "deserving" child in need of medical care, and unable to pay, shall go without aid.
