U. of M. Registration Reaches All-time High

An all-time enrollment record of 11,366 students at the University of Michigan was announced at the end of the second week of classes by Miss Marjane Williams, statistician in the Registrar's Office.

This figure represents a gain of 521 students, or 4.8 per cent, over the registration at the corresponding date last year.

Enrollment of men stood at 5,075 an increase of five per cent over last year, while an increase of 4.4 per cent put the registration of women up to a new high of 6,291.

Registration in the literary college dropped 4.7 per cent whereas the number of engineering students increased over 10 per cent. The graduate school enrollment increased 17 per cent to a new high of 2,117.
