

NORMAN PRICE COMPLETES A&P ANNIVERSARY PICTURE



A&P's beginning in a little shop in Vesey Street of Old New York. It was in the early fall of 1859 that a high-masted sailing vessel carried to America's shores A&P's first stock in trade, a cargo of Canton tea brought from half way around the world. A&P began its business with that clipper ship cargo of tea.

In creating his A&P Anniversary "theme picture," Norman Price's artistic ability of pen and brush was supplemented by a comprehensive, intimate knowledge of the subject. He spent many hours in research before the first line of the picture was drawn. Even after the composition was well worked out and the details carefully sketched, Mr. Price had an old sailor who had spent years "before the mast" check all details of the construction of the clipper ship and its rigging, so that every line would be technically accurate.

STATE TREASURER WINS WIDESPREAD PUBLIC APPROVAL

Mr. and Mrs. Norman Lee To Attend M.S.C. Services

Norman Donald Lee, son of Farmington's postmaster, Norman Lee, is attending Michigan State College and is a resident of Stevens T. Mason Hall, new men's dormitory, which is being dedicated Sunday afternoon.

Mr. and Mrs. Lee will attend the dedicatory services in Lansing. Parents and friends of the 436 residents as well as the descendants of Stevens T. Mason, Michigan's first governor, and members of the State Board of Agriculture have been invited to attend.

Mason Hall is a part of the College's self-financed building program, and in the first of four projected dormitories which will form a quadrangle, housing 2,000 new students. The second, Abbot Hall, is already under construction and will be ready for use next September.

A short dedicatory service will be held in Mason Hall at 2:30 p. m. Sunday, followed by a general reception for Mason Hall residents' parents, and for the faculty, townspeople and others from 2 to 5 p. m.

Completion of Abbot Hall next summer, along with a hospital, field house, auditorium, women's dormitory, veterinary clinic, and heat and heat-exhaustion, will complete a \$5,800,000 building program, which also includes Mary Mayo and Sarah Langdon Williams women's dormitories, and a WPA beautification project. Total cost to the State for the entire program will be \$142,150.
