

SPRINGER; SPANIEL FIELD TRIAL HERE ON NOV. 6

Farmington is to be the scene of a field trial for springer spaniels, an event licensed by the American Kennel Club, on Nov. 6 at Durgan Downs. This is the home of Guy Durgan, 3619 Grand River, west of Drake Road.

This trial will be the first one for springer spaniels held in Farmington that has been licensed by the A.K.C. Durgan says. For the past two years they have been held in Ann Arbor.

"Anyone interested in entering a springer spaniel may do so. The fee for dogs of all ages is \$10; for puppies and novices it is \$5," Mr.

Durgan says. Judging will be on the basis of the style the dogs show in hunting and retrieving; on their spirit; and the way which they respond to their master's controls.

The run will be made on planted pheasants, Mr. Durgan says. This means that pheasants will be revolved until they are nearly unable to move around; then they will be placed a considerable distance from the dogs, Mr. Durgan explained.

The field trial is being put on by the English Springer Spaniel Club of Michigan. Trophies and ribbons will be awarded and refreshments will be sold. Anyone wishing to enter is asked to communicate with Mr. Durgan.

The lines belonged to the Hartford Electric Light Co., which is not affiliated with Detroit Edison. "This is the first time the Detroit Edison has ever done this," Bagnall says. The men were in Hartford three weeks. The Michigan Bell Telephone Co. and the Consumers Power Co. also sent linemen and foremen to the East to assist in the salvage work.
