Judge To Speak Over the Radio

James H. Lynch, Judge of the Probate and Juvenile courts and Democratic candidate to fill a vacancy in that office, will speak over Radio Station WFLX, Friday night at 9:45 o'clock. The talk will wind up his campaign for Probate judge, the office he has filled since his appointment by Gov. Frank Murphy last year.

Judge Lynch, who it is believed will be favored by both Democratic and Republican voters at the election next Tuesday, will talk for 15 minutes on the work of the Probate and Juvenile courts. Basing his talk largely on his experience in both courts for the past 16 months, Judge Lynch will attempt to give his listeners a clear picture of the work involved and will state what he believes to be the proper qualifications necessary by whomsoever is chosen to fill that important branch of the local judiciary.

Protects Children Undoubtedly the most important and most interesting among the duties of the Probate court judge is the work with juveniles who appear before him in the Juvenile court. Within a period of one year, beginning July 1, 1937, Judge Lynch has considered the problems of more than 350 children and has disposed of more than 1,200 cases of delinquency, truancy and negligence.

Judge Lynch assumed the duties of both the Probate and Juvenile courts upon the death of Judge Dan McGaffey, who had been elected to serve four years. Governor Murphy, in selecting the prominent Oakland County jurist who at that time was on the bench, stated: "It does not often come to a Chief Executive to have the privilege of appointing one whose life has been so rich in good deeds and who has had such distinction to the practice of his profession. . . . In naming you to the important office I have borne in mind the half-century service you have given to the upbuilding of your community and your state."

According to law, Judge Lynch must be elected next Tuesday to complete the remaining two years of the term. His record in both the Probate and Juvenile courts since his appointment, and his civic work in the county for more than 50 years, has placed him among the best-known public-minded citizens. Though he participated in the county's political history since 1885, the present campaign is his second personal venture in elective politics.

Won State Acclaim During the World War Judge Lynch won statewide acclaim for

his attitude toward competitive bidding in Michigan. While a member of the Oakland County War board and member of the State Democratic Central committee, he created a stir when he resigned as a member of the County committee because of his belief that "it is not wisdom to launch a political campaign in the nation involved in a war which calls for the best efforts of every American citizen."

Detroit and Oakland county newspapers commended the attitude taken by Judge Lynch and lauded him for his consistent patriotism.

Judge Lynch, known affectionately throughout the county as "Jumpy," will complete a lifetime of notable service should his desires to complete the term be realized. He has no platform except his record, and no pledge other than he shall do his duty as he sees it to do it.

RAYMOND W. STARR LEADS WAR AGAINST DRUG MARIHUANA

Attorney General Raymond W. Starr today asked the people of metropolitan Detroit to help drive out of Michigan that dangerous narcotic, Marihuana.

"The use of Marihuana is an evil spreading throughout the country," said Starr. "Vicious criminals are attempting to teach high school children and young working men and women to use this drug. Its use leads to insanity, degeneracy and brutal crime."

Attorney General Starr stressed the fact that he is bending every effort of his office to the discovery and elimination of the growing plant and to the discovery and elimination from Michigan of all those who traffic in the manufactured drug.

"But mothers and fathers, teachers, doctors and nurses must lend the fight to drive Marihuana out of Michigan," said Starr.

"There is a Michigan Marihuana law now in effect. It should be made to work and can be made to work with the help of all those who believe in law and decency."
