LEGION'S ROLE IN EDUCATION IS DISCUSSED

W. B. Gambee, publicity chairman of the American Legion, discussed in his article this week the role that the Legion has played in the furthering of educational progress in this country. The article follows: "The American Legion's interest in the processes of American education stems directly from the experiences of its members in the World War. Two things learned by the American soldier as a citizen called to his highest duty—defense of his country—carried over into his post-war life. One was that the tools of education had not been placed within reach of all the native-born population of America. Consequently, there was illiteracy among a large number of our neglected citizens and they could not participate fully in the endeavor to have America achieve the high ideals of its founders. The other was that we had continued to accept the foreign-born who lived among us, with little or no thought for the manner in which they assumed the duties and privileges of American citizenship. The American Legion could visualize the necessity for changing these conditions, and the Legionnaire could determine that America shouldn't face another similar emergency with such a handicap. He could realize that a nation so handicapped in war is similarly lacking in the means to achieve the best from its citizens in time of peace. The desire to improve educational principles and opportunities led the American Legion with the National Education Association and the U. S. Office of Education to conduct the American Education Week. Working with these agencies the Legion could focus attention upon the needs of America's public school system. Because war's experiences convinced the Legionnaire of the high cost of illiteracy he turned to the educators to see how the national efforts of The American Legion could best be used for two practical reasons: first, to secure from a study of the America that went to war a complete knowledge of its educational and cultural shortcomings; second, to see how the American Legion could improve these conditions. American Education Week, inaugurated in 1921, has been powerful in acquainting the public with the schools' needs, with mounting interest in the development of an educational system to keep

pace with industrial progress in America, the attention of the public had been centered upon educational problems through American Education Week. In 1937 nearly ten million visited schools and interest carries over into the past of the school year, and the public is better able to cope with the problems of education. With two million youths reaching the voting age the need for new leadership is developing. So that the proper type of leadership shall develop, the American Legion is pledged to continue with the National Education Association and the U. S. Office of Education to work for the ideal of equality of educational opportunity.

William Lyon Phelps Is On Town Hall Wednesday

William Lyon Phelps, nationally popular book critic, educator, philosopher, who packed them in last year and the year before, will again address the Detroit Town Hall audience in the Fisher Theatre, 11 a. m., next Wednesday, speaking on "Contemporary Books." Professor emeritus of Yale University, who for 32 years was Lamson professor of English literature, Dr. Phelps has thousands of followers in Michigan. He has spent his summers in Michigan for more than 40 years, preaching at Huron City in the Thumb. His Sunday afternoon sermons, drawing people from all over the State, proved so popular that it was necessary to enlarge the church twice to its present capacity of 1,000. A dynamic speaker, Dr. Phelps was for many years Yale's public orator and ambassador to the world at large. Today he writes a syndicated literary column reaching 10,000,000 readers, and is heard frequently over national radio networks.

Veterans' Rally Will Ask Congress for Laws

On Sunday afternoon, a rally of all World War veterans will be held at the Veterans of Foreign Wars hall, at 1376 Leasure Avenue, one block west of Schaeffer between Grand River and Schoolcraft. The principal subjects to be discussed are proposed new and revised legislation to be considered at the forthcoming meetings of the legislature and congress. The state legislature will be asked to enact regulations giving World War veterans tax exemption similar to that allowed to Spanish and Civil War veterans. Other important items on the calendar are veterans' preference on civil service and increased allowance to widows and orphans of deceased veterans. Congress will be asked to enact laws which will tend to wipe out the 40-year deadline that now exists in most industrial plants, as far as veterans are concerned, as well as to enforce the present regulations favoring veterans preference in the WPA and other governmental projects. Important information regarding the new veterans' hospital in Dearborn, which will be opened early in 1935, is to be presented at this meeting.
