

Bids Raise School Cost Problem

Farmington Board of Education will hold a special meeting, Tuesday, June 10, 1936, at 7:30 p. m. to consider the proposed action relative to the new school building, the lowest among bids received having exceeded money available by about \$60,000. The lowest bids for three types of work total \$96,000 while \$74,000 is the sum on hand payable for the job. Bids were opened Monday evening.

A sharp cutting down of the quality of material of the building, curtailment of its size, omission of portions which would be left for a later date, or raising of additional money, appear to be the three alternatives open.

The low bid for construction work only is \$74,000. The offer on the plumbing and heating contract is \$16,300, and the bid on electrical is \$45,785.
