How 6 SC Trustees Picked Brown

Several names were considered by six Schoolcraft College trustees in a private coffee klatch before the trustees agreed to ask Erwin Brown to rejoin the board in place of Dr. George Martin, who resigned.

Brown, who brings financial expertise to the board, had previously served on it between 1962-65 after he was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Ward McCain who had died. He did not seek reelection.

Brown's appointment has stirred criticism because many had expected the board elected on Sept. 13 to make the appointment. After the election, only two former board members, Dr. Robert Goake and John LaRue, will be left.

SIX BOARD members, excluding Dr. James Boswell and Martin, had been invited to the home of the college's new president, Dr. C. Nelson Grote, on Aug. 16 for a primarily social meeting.

according to trustee B. William Secord.

Secord said Dr. James Boswell was not invited because Boswell's phone number was not listed and there was not sufficient time to notify him by mail.

When the discussion at the recent Schoolcraft board meeting turned to the appointment of a new board member, Boswell protested that he had not been informed of the board's intention to make the appointment and left the meeting after Brown was voted into office.

Both Secord and Board Chairman Jane Moehle said the meeting at Dr. Grote's house was primarily social, but since Martin's resignation was not anticipated, the discussion focused on whom to appoint in Martin's place.

THE BOARD was advised in a letter dated Aug. 10 from the law firm Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone, that it was the current board's responsibility to fill the post. Boswell was mailed a copy of the

letter, Mrs. Moehle said.

"He never called me with a question or suggestion," Mrs. Moehle said in answer to Boswell's allegation that he was not consulted on the appointment.

The board did not attempt to get suggestions from the public on whom to appoint to the post.

"What we wanted to do was maintain some people with experience on the board," Secord said concerning the meeting.

Several names were considered including Tom Winkler, former president of the Student Senate, and Dr. Gordon Forrer, former trustee, according to Secord.

Mrs. Moehle said they even considered appointing one of the 17 candidates to the post but they realized that it was "absurd" to try to select one of them.

Secord said Brown has highly recommended by the trustees. They called Brown that night to see if he would be willing to assume the position, and he returned an affirmative answer about an

hour later, Secord said.

THE NEW Democratic Coalition of Livonia protested Brown's appointment, saying: "The voters of the Schoolcraft District have been denied due representation in filling the vacancy" and called for his resignation.

They criticized the lame duck board for making the appointment since it "preempted the opportunity for the newly-elected board to make an appointment reflecting the voters' wishes."

The administration as well as the board members expressed pleasure with Brown's acceptance.

There are two years left in Martin's term.

Brown also served on the Livonia Board of Education from 1968-69 and 1969-70, when he resigned to move to Livonia on an assignment with Ford Motor Co. He is a cost analyst for Ford.

A resident of Livonia for 17 years, Brown is married with three children, two of whom attended Schoolcraft.

\$860,000 Expansion Set For S'craft Voc-Tech

Preliminary plans for an \$860,000 addition to Schoolcraft College's

Vocational-Technical Building that would bring the college's programs under one roof have been approved by the Board of Trustees.

The 24,864 square foot addition will house an automotive components lab, an occupational therapy lab, the electro-medical facilities, civil technology lab, and facilities for the business classes as well as office space and classrooms.

Scheduled for completion in the fall of 1972, the addition will be financed with funds available from the 1968 millage.

The addition will be built regardless of whether the Sept. 13 millage is passed. If the two half-mill proposals pass, the college will apply for state construction funds for a fine arts building.

THE ADDITION will not provide for new programs but will take care of the programs that are not adequately housed now, said Jon Adams, vocational-technical dean.

He explained that programs such as occupational therapy, which is currently housed in three rooms in Northville State Hospital, will be brought into the addition.

The electro-medical technology program, which has been scattered, will be put in the new building, and the lab for the program will be shared for nursing classes and medical lab technology classes.

"Our program is one of the very first in the country and the only one in the state," Adams said.

He said the electro-medical program was started a year ago to train persons in the growing area of electrical machinery used in hospitals.

CURRENTLY housed in "assorted hospitals," the medical records technology program will be brought into the addition.
