Mrs. Thomas Sr., of Six Mile Road has been spending a few weeks' vacation in Detroit.

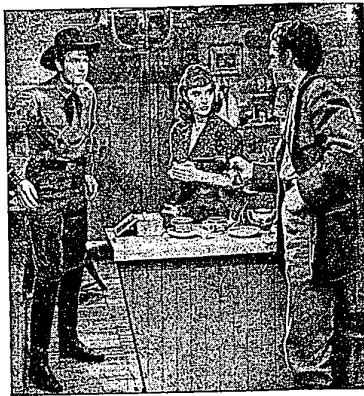
Mr. and Mrs. Robert Fredericks were guests Sunday of Rev. Breitbach of Saline.

## ISLE ROYALE TO BE DEDICATED AS NATIONAL PARK

The dedication of Isle Royale as a National Park which was scheduled for this summer but has been postponed until next year has served to focus attention on this magnificent, primitive island, according to E. J. Goebel, traffic manager manager of the Georgian Bay Line.

Mr. Goebel reports that passengers taking the cruise on the S. S. Alabama which stops at Isle Royale on its run between Buffalo, Cleveland, Detroit and Duluth are primarily interested in information about the island.

"Few people, even in Michigan, realize that this island is the largest between Long Island and Puget Sound," stated Mr. Goebel. "It is approximately 44 miles long, with an average width of 5 miles or approximately 132,000 acres. There are 24 islands lakes totaling 7,880 acres."

A Primeval Land "It is undoubtedly one of the most primitive stretches of land on the North American continent and because of its unspoiled condition serves as a perfect textbook for scientists and students. This primitive state is undoubtedly due to the fact that the rugged formation of moss and forest-covered mass of gigantic rocks have prevented men from stepping the forest."

Representatives of the National Park Service of the Department of the Interior which will take over the park and throw it open to the public after the land acquisition has been completed this year, have stated that the Isle Royale will be kept in its primitive state. It will be a park without roads, without automobiles and without saddle horses.

"Travel will be by boat and by primitive forest trails, and many of these trails have already been constructed. Thus, conserved by our Government, it will undoubtedly become famous as the one great wilderness tract in this country, noted for the herd of Moose—at the present time the largest in this country—and for other wild life, and for excellent fishing."

## To Enforce Parallel Parking On Highways

Uniform regulations for parallel parking on all city or village streets on the state highway system will go into effect for the first time on September 29.

Section 27a of Act No. 183 of the recent session of the legislature handles angle parking within city limits. The Act does provide, however, that local authorities may by ordinance permit angle parking upon highways other than state trunkline highways. The Act has been signed by the Governor and will become effective on September 29, 1939.

State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagener joined with other safety and traffic leaders in welcoming this action by the legislature. He said that the elimination of angle parking on state trunkline highways within cities and villages would eliminate serious congestion problems and improve safety for motorists and pedestrians alike.

## ENJOYING PICNIC LUNCH AT N. Y. WORLD'S FAIR



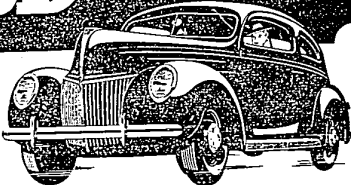

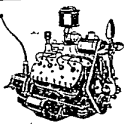

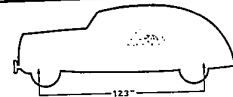

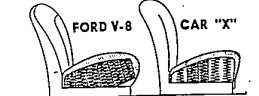
