BUILDERS SHOW INTEREST IN NEW LOAN PROGRAM

Two weeks after the announcement of regulations making possible 15 year loans for the building of small houses under Title I of the National Housing Act, builders and home-seekers throughout the state have become interested in the possibilities of this new program, according to Raymond M. Foley, State Director for Michigan of the Federal Housing Administration. Several lending institutions have already signified their intentions of making such loans to acceptable borrowers, Foley said.

While it is not possible yet to say that lending institutions in all cities of Michigan nor all lending institutions in any city, are prepared to make these loans, Foley said, "still we are encouraged to believe that financing of this type will shortly be generally available. It is quite possible that in the beginning many lending institutions will not be prepared to make these loans to the full extent permitted by the new regulations, namely, for 15 year terms and for a maximum of \$2,500 and with as low as five per cent equity in the property on the part of the borrower. However, there are indications that for a great many persons such loans will be available on a practical basis.

It is interesting to note that under this set-up a loan for \$2,500 obtained for the maximum period of 15 years would result in monthly payments, exclusive of property taxes and property insurance, of \$9.30. With this loan it would be possible to build a substantial small house meeting the minimum requirements set up in these new regulations and in locations which would not be eligible for larger loans to build more expensive houses.

DESTRUCTION OF RAGWEED TO BE CONTINUED

State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagener decided this week the highway department's newly initiated policy of destroying ragweed along right-of-ways would be continued through his administration.

The original order to maintenance crews to clear the weed, which irritates hay fever sufferers, from 9,000 miles of trunkline right-of-way brought a flood of commendatory and critical comments from hay fever victims.

Most of the criticism was directed at the so-called inadequacy of a program which would clear the roadside of the weed but permit it to grow in adjoining fields. Botanists said the ragweed pollen was carried also from neighboring states.

Maintenance officials were convinced, following conferences with experts, that passing automobiles

stirred the pollen along right-of-way and gave hay fever sufferers visiting Michigan for relief immediate contact.

Van Wagener said the eradication campaign would be continued through growing months this fall and launched again with the first growth next Spring.

HOME GROWN HARDWOODS

For many purposes, homegrown timber can provide lumber as good or sometimes better than standard lumber stocks. Growths of ash, elm, beech, birch, black locust, red oak, hickory and maple in Oakland county offer means of cutting lumber bills if the sawed material is used for purposes to which it is adapted. Pine or other noniferous lumber is easier to cut and shape and nail, but in the rest of the twenty lumber qualities does not rank as high as some of the hardwoods. Farmers' Bulletin 1765, "Selection of Lumber" lists qualities and usage of various types of lumber as an aid to farmers who

haul logs to a mill or patronize custom sawyers with portable mills.
