And while you're computing, she's off on description of zipping her tall three-wheel bicycle down Florida highways, traveling around this country, Europe, the Bahamas and the Orient, and launching all sorts of whimsical projects to keep life interesting.

"My bike was the first one in the trailer court where I live in Florida," she said. "Now lots of people have them there, but I'm the only one who rides on the main highway."

Mrs. Wick said she uses "two mirrors and lots of caution" to head for a regular early morning swim in the Gulf of Mexico. "And when I get there I can easily swim for an hour without tiring when the water is smooth," she added.

DORIS WICK said she decided to "run away from home" and see the world when family ties no longer kept her in Plymouth, and she's seen more than many people pack into a lifetime of vacations.

Having a member of the family as an airline employee has helped her mobility. But so has willingness to take temporary jobs when funds were needed and to put up with traveling conditions that might be uncomfortable but would always be interesting. Cases in point are the six-month stay in Seattle with "side trips" to Alaska, Hawaii and Vancouver - and a 99-day Greyhound trip that took her to most of the United States and was interrupted by a jaunt to Europe.

"I slept on the bus," Mrs. Wick said, "and I liked to talk to people everywhere. I wore a great big watch on a chain around my neck - I wanted to be known as the lady with the watch because it was a passport to all kinds of meetings with people."

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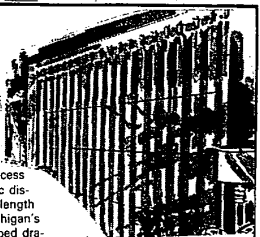
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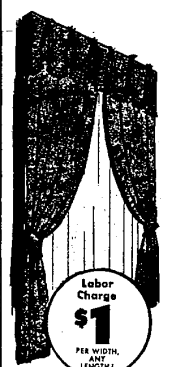
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## Registrations Open Sept. 13
