At least that is the way Mrs. Ray A. Meyers, 25317 Ravine Rd., Southfield, feels about the stray dog that had been making daily appearances in the neighborhood for the past week and she'd like to find a home for them. "At first we thought the dog was a nuisance," she said, "as it continued to raid the garbage cans in the area. "IT WAS SO skinny that we started feeding it. Then we found that each time we fed it, the dog, a mixed breed with the longest nose and most beautiful face, walked away and we wouldn't see her until the next day." Mrs. Meyers, herself a dog lover, phoned all over the area and could find no trace of her owner. Then, last Thursday night, her little granddaughter followed the dog down into the heart strings," she said, "to deep ravines between Edgemoor and Ravine, north of 10 Mile Rd. and two blocks east of Inkster. "There she found five of the cutest puppies, all cuddled up, waiting for mother's return," Mrs. Meyers stated. "Now we've got them at home -- but we have no room for them. "SO, if anyone wants a real, fine, well trained dog, and her family of five, they never could find a better family.
