

# C'ville Senior Is Cinderella Queen

A 17-year-old Clarenceville High School senior will reign as Cinderella Ball Queen at the Oct. 2 C'ville Senior Ball. The original will be presented to Miss McCarville, Cinderella Ball staged annually by the women's committee of the Tuberculosis and Health Society.

She is Theresa McCarville of 1946 Weyher, Livonia. Mrs. Robert Winter was chairman of the Cinderella selection committee.

Theresa is the youngest of 10 children of Mr. and Mrs. Edward McCarville. Her experience with tuberculosis came when she was eight years old. She spent four months in Maybury Sanatorium and another year as an out-patient of Herman Kiefer Hospital on a program of preventive medicine.

Music for the ball will be by Buddy Morrow, a style show in fur will feature a Persian lamb collection, and Douglas A. Schubert will present a golden slipper to Cinderella.

Tom Powell, internationally famed comedian, pickpocket and singer, will serve as master of ceremonies.

Henry deSagor Lauve has again done the official portrait

of Cinderella for use in the ball program. The original will be presented to Miss McCarville.

Proceeds of the ball are used by the Women's Committee to finance projects to combat tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases.

The ball first held in 1950, annually is the first major event of Detroit's social season.

It is surprising for me to realize that what at first appeared to be a common winter cold could result in my selection to be the 1971 Cinderella and Christmas Seal chairman.

I was only eight years old when I caught a winter cold that eventually led me to Maybury Sanatorium as a victim of tuberculosis.

It started simply enough. I was ice skating, and when I finished I took off my skates, but I couldn't find my boots to wear home.

I walked around in my stocking feet looking for my boots. Perhaps I walked too long and too far. At any rate, a

cold developed and, perhaps fortunately, it turned into pneumonia and pleurisy.

THESE COMPLICATIONS resulted in further diagnosis, and it was decided that I should enter Maybury Sanatorium for a few weeks for more intensive examination.

Those four weeks turned out to be four long months.

Even with a ward full of playmates, I was still terribly lonesome for home.

My home is in Livonia with my parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward McCarville. I am the youngest of 10 children and it seems there was always someone to talk to.

Nevertheless, I was out in four months, but I was on medication for a year and made many trips to Herman Kiefer Hospital for examination and more medication.

I still get an annual chest x-ray to make certain there is no recurrence of tuberculosis. It is reassuring to know that I am now in good health.

I AM ATTENDING Clarenceville High School. This is my senior year. I am majoring in English and History.

After high school, I plan to further my education at Central Michigan University and I hope to get a degree in special education.

I spent the last few months attending John Roberts Powers School on a grant arranged by the Tuberculosis and Health Society. Additionally, I worked part time.

Although, right now I am still on the threshold of my reign as Cinderella and as Michigan's Christmas Seal chairman, I am sure it will be a truly rewarding experience.

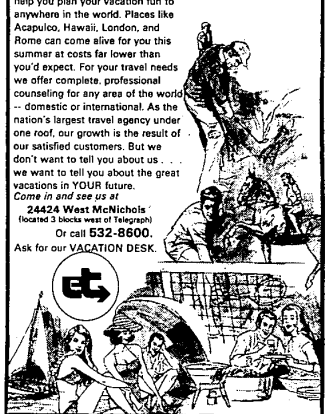
