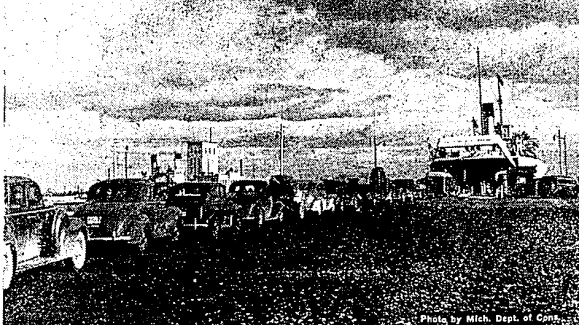
STODDARD TO PAY FAMILY OF GIRL INJURED IN CRASH

A further continuance was granted this week in Circuit Court by Judge Russel Holland in the case of Edward Stoddard, 56, of 1537 Seward street, Detroit, who is awaiting sentencing on a charge of felonious driving.

Stoddard was the driver of a car that crashed into another machine on Grand River avenue near Novi last June, injuring nine year old Margaret Marks of Detroit, Miss Elleen Guzenos and Mrs. Ethel Price, of Lansing. The child lost her right eye as a result of the crash.

The court was of the opinion Mr. Stoddard should be given probation on condition he pays the family of the Marks child \$1,017.15 of which \$400 would be paid in cash and the remainder in installments spread over three years. This arrangement, the court said, is satisfactory to Stoddard. The case was not disposed of Saturday because the child must first have a guardian appointed to her.
