SENATOR BROWN ASKS DEVELOPEMENT OF U. S. AND PUERTO RICO BEFORE CUBA

Washington, D. C.—Belief that present factory capacity for sugar production for continental United States, Puerto Rico and Hawaii as against foreign imports, should be written into any future sugar quota bill, was expressed here today by Senator Prentiss Brown of Michigan.

At the same time, the Michigan Senator said he is strongly opposed to the move to again reduce the tariff on Cuban sugar, and pointed out that he was among the first to register strong protest to the State Department when the proposal was first made known.

"Because of the present situation, which has provided an ample European market for Cuban sugar, and outlet for sugar from other sources, there is some talk that no new quota bill will be written next year," Senator Brown said.

"It is too early as yet to tell definitely," he declared, "but if there is a new quota bill, I certainly will use my influence and vote toward much larger quotas for American producers."

He said he would pursue such a course for the welfare of consumers as well as producers in this country.

In former war periods as soon as Europe provided a market for Cuban sugar, that country with-

drew its sugar from the United States market, and since we had given Cuba a large share of the domestic market under the quota system, prices went soaring," he pointed out.

"This demonstrated the fallacy of making our people dependent on foreign countries for so large a share of their sugar supply, and I am confident that if we do return to the quota system, this fault will be remedied and our own producers allowed to supply a much larger portion of the domestic demand."

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WHOOPIING COUGH VACCINE OFFERED TO PHYSICIANS

Whooping cough will be on the defensive in Michigan as a result of the development of a new vaccine for its prevention, according to Dr. H. Allen Moyer, commissioner.

The new vaccine is being made available free to physicians this week at distributing stations throughout the state. Dr. Moyer urged all physicians to make use of this new preventive immediately on as wide a scale as possible. A supply is now available to meet all expected demands.

Whooping cough, known to the medical profession as pertussis, is considered one of the most dangerous diseases of early childhood. It causes more than 100 deaths annually, taking more lives of children under ten than diphtheria and scarlet fever.

Children under two years of age are especially susceptible. Health officials and doctors recommend that children be protected against whooping cough before the ages of three and six months.

The new vaccine has been released only after months of research and experimentation under the direction of Dr. Pearl Kendrick, head of the Department of Western Michigan Division Laboratory at Grand Rapids. Results of 44 months of field tests with the vaccine have indicated its value in the prevention of whooping cough.

EVERGREENS NEED WATER

Evergreens, as their designation implies, retain their needlelike foliage throughout the year. Because of this there are seasons when specimen trees can be protected from winter damage by seeing that they do not become too dry in fall and winter. Watering should not be done in freezing weather or when the soil is solidly frozen. After a thorough watering, especially with newly planted evergreens, a thick mulch will cut down evaporation of the water intended for the use of the tree.

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
