Evergreens, as their designation implies, retain their needlelike foliage throughout the year. Because of this there are seasons when specimen trees can be protected from winter damage by seeing that they do not become too dry even in fall and winter. Watering should not be done in freezing weather or when the soil is solidly frozen. After a thorough watering, especially with newly planted evergreens, a thick mulch will cut down evaporation of the water intended for the use of the tree.

PWA HAS 57 NEW WATER SYSTEMS WITHIN STATE

People of the State of Michigan are being served by 57 new or improved water supply systems constructed as Public Works Administration projects, according to a summary reported to D. R. Kennet, chief of PWA Region No. 2.

These waterworks projects have cost approximately \$10,000,000 of which the Public Works Administration has provided approximately \$1,000,000.

At the same time public health in the State of Michigan has been further safeguarded by the construction of 40 sewage disposal plants and twelve sewer systems, all PWA projects, the waterworks and the closely related sewage disposal and sewage systems having an aggregate value of \$49,000,000 in round numbers, for a total PWA provided outright grants totaling \$21,000,000 and made loans aggregating \$13,000,000.

These public works have all been constructed in the six years since the Public Works Administration was established by Act of Congress.

A great step forward in the state plans for the prevention of pollution of streams has been made in the new disposal plants scattered over the State. Many cities applied for PWA funds for disposal plants which could not be granted at the time because the 1938 appropriation was exhausted.

In the entire country PWA has allotted funds for 2,691 waterworks projects with a total estimated cost of approximately \$381,000,000. According to figures collected by the F. W. Dodge Corporation, waterworks constructed with the aid of PWA funds in the 37 states east of the Rocky Mountains constituted 72.5 per cent of the total value of water supply construction in this territory. The portion allotted by PWA in outright grants was \$141,000,000.

The disposal plants not only have removed pollution from the streams and prevented the contamination of water supply for homes, thus reducing the dangers of typhoid epidemics, but have added a valuable asset in the way of fertilizer. The new Southwest Disposal Plant in Chicago, largest in the world constructed at a cost of about \$16,000,000 has recently signed a contract with a fertilizer firm for the sale of sludge that will guarantee the Chicago Sanitary

District an income of about \$400,000.

Another use for the sludge derived by this great plant is for fuel. If the sludge can be sold for fertilizer at a profit over the price of coal, it is so used. When it is not profitable to sell it as fertilizer it can be dried and used as fuel.

In addition to new water systems, numerous water softening, iron removing, and filtration plants have been constructed, notably Chicago's great filtration plant now under construction.

WATER WILL MAKE CHRISTMAS TREES HOLD NEEDLES

It's nearly time to select and decorate a Yuletide tree, which brings up that perennial question of what kind of a tree will best hold its needles or what can be done to a tree to make it hold its needles until the holiday season is over.

Experiences and knowledge of a forester in the extension service of Michigan State College, W. Ira Bull, offer pointers.

Balsam fir and pines hold their needles longer than spruce. Forster Bull says. Pines are readily identified because they have needles two to four inches long compared with the one-inch needles on spruce and fir. Spruce and fir bear single needles, while clusters of two, three or five are found on pine branches.

"Most confusing are spruce and fir," says Mr. Bull. "But here's a little trick. Pluck a needle from each tree and try to turn these needles over and over between the thumb and finger. The needle that turns readily and appears to have three to four sides is spruce. The fir needle is flat, so it will not turn when pressure is applied by the thumb."

Here are the man's tips on tree care: Fresh cut trees keep in better condition in the house than trees cut two weeks or a month before Christmas. There is a wax spray now sold commercially that can be applied to freshly cut trees to prevent needles from falling.

Trees purchased from a store or sales lot are partially dry before they reach the consumer. These trees, however, will keep in better condition if three to four inches of the dried butt end are cut off and the freshly cut stub end placed in water or in a pail of wet sand.

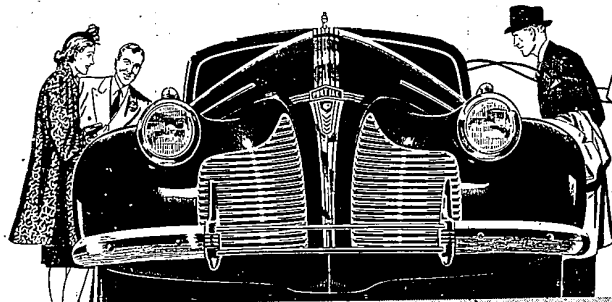
