FARMINGTON TO HOLD ANNUAL PRESIDENT'S BALL

Plans for Farmington's annual President's Birthday Ball have been started. Frank N. Steele, chairman, announces that the ball will be held January 29, with Farmington City and Farmington Township co-operating. The party will probably be held in the new high school gymnasium, although definite announcement as to location will come later.

Mayor T. L. Deegenhardt, of Farmdale, is Oakland County chairman. Each of Michigan's 83 counties has formed a committee and is actively campaigning for funds for the fight against infantile paralysis.

"The fact that 83 counties have organized this year is very gratifying to the state committee," declared Abner E. Larned, state chairman. "It means that Michigan will again take an outstanding place in this great humanitarian campaign."

The spirit which has been manifested throughout the state this year has surprised me, as accustomed as I am to the warmheartedness of our people toward its annual campaign.

"In every county in Michigan, some outstanding citizen, has agreed to act as Chairman. This means that during January, events of various kinds will be held to raise funds, 50 per cent of which will remain in the local county and 50 per cent to be sent to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis for scientific research to find the origin of this dread disease."

"To each county chairman and each community chairman I want to express my heartfelt appreciation and the wish that each endeavor undertaken will be a real success."

Heading the state-wide committee is Governor Luren D. Dickinson, as honorary chairman. United States Senators Arthur H. Vandenberg and Prentiss M. Brown are committeemen as are Mayors Edward J. Jeffries, of Detroit, George W. Welsh, of Grand Rapids, Harry M. Commins, of Flint and the mayors of 38 other Michigan cities.

Conservation Officers To Get Service Stars

Gold stars affixed to the left sleeves of uniforms will in future denote length of service of Michigan's conservation officers.

Each star represents five years' service. Oldest veteran in the department, in point of service, will wear seven stars. Another will wear six and five will wear five stars. Four men have been with the department more than 20 years. Twenty-three men have 15 years' service, or more. Thirty-nine men will wear two stars and 49 men qualify for one star. In all, 122 conservation officers, district and regional supervisors, and other grades of the field administration division, are being issued stars for five years' service or more.
