SNOW SCOOTER REVIVED FOR WINTER SPORT

"Saddle ski," "Michigan potato," "snow scooter" or whatever you want to call it, the new coasting device is gaining popularity among Michigan snow sports fans interested more in fun than formality.

As produced in home workshop or factory in recent years, the typical scooter consists of a single short ski or runner supporting a

short post and low seat. It is ridden downhill, and even over short jumps by balancing on the seat of the coaster's ability. The rider, child or grownup, can feel secure in knowing he cannot fall far. The coaster is light enough to be carried back uphill under the arm, small enough to be stored in a car trunk. Old timers who called them "jumpers" when they were made out of barrel staves consider their present use only a revival.

Such is the popularity of the device, a "two-skooter derby" was one of the features of the Pottery winter carnival February 3 and 4.

SOCIAL SECURITY TAXES GO INTO TRUST FUNDS

Taxes which are now being paid into the U. S. Treasury under the Social Security Act are placed in the old-age and survivors insurance trust fund. This trust fund was set up by the amendments to the Social Security Act, as passed by the Congress last August.

This trust fund is held by the board of trustees composed of the secretary of the treasury as managing trustee, the secretary of labor and the chairman of the Social Security Board.

Workers holding social security numbers should keep their cards and preserve them throughout their lifetime. This card should be shown to every new employer so that he may have the correct name and social security number of his workers. The employer is required to report this information to the collector of internal revenue when paying taxes under the Social Security Act. A worker who loses his card should not get a duplicate, not a new number.

If a worker discovers that he has made a mistake on his original application for a social security number he should obtain a form which is used to make corrections. These forms may be obtained at any field office of the Social Security Board.
