

PRECAUTIONS FOR ENSILING GRASS ARE ENUMERATED

When two doctors meet and shake their heads, the patient needs extra care even if that patient is such an inert composite as one finds in grass ensilage.

What's the reason? Ensiling grass has taken the fancy of the average Michigan farmer in advance of the time when all the se-

crets have been probed by the staff at Michigan State College. Dr. T. S. Dexter in farm crops and Dr. C. F. Hoffman in dairy husbandry have been searching for foolproof methods of making silage from grass and alfalfa. They've discovered some of the things to do and not to do, but admit there still is much to learn.

But farmers are impatient. So for those who wish to take the process in the spring of 1940, here are some of the doctors' orders: Alfalfa or alfalfa and grass or just plain grass cut for silage can be too wet if it is not mature. Cut when you would mow for hay in full bloom.

Don't cut too much at a time, for this same cutting may become too dry before it goes into the silo. It can be made into the silo filter is enough to cut at a time. If the feeder is efficient the swath need not be raked into a windrow. Keep someone in the silo to spread and tramp.

Do not hurry the job even in filling a small silo. Settling and reilling is an aid to a better product. Especially with alfalfa a preservative such as molasses is needed—using about 40 pounds to a ton of green material. This should be set to cut short lengths from a half to a quarter inch. The rest laid out into the silo should be fairly green and especially well raked down.

With the process being popular, Dexter and Hoffman believe that improved quality of the product over may especially in view of losses of 40 per cent in nutrients when haying makes runs into adverse curing weather. Ability to make feed instead of selling a fine cutting practically ruined by rainstrips on the hayfield, are reasons the grass silage idea is taking hold in Michigan.

LICENSE BUREAU READY FOR LAST MINUTE RUSH

Anticipating a terrific last minute demand for 1939 license plates, Harry F. Kelly, Secretary of State, announced this week that all divisions of his department are in high gear to take care of the greatest plate sale in Michigan's history.

"A satisfactory showing has been made to date," Kelly said, "with about 45,000 more sets of plates sold this year than during the registrations of 1939 far. However the previous year and we must look forward to the enormous task of supplying license plates to thousands of late buyers."

Kelly stated that the license plate business totaled more than \$20,000,000 last year. This sum of money, coupled with more than \$30,000,000 received from the state division is turned over to the highway department. The counties in turn, receive all the money collected from the sale of license plates and six and one-half million dollars from the gasoline tax receipts.

This money, spent for new highways, bridges, underpass projects, the elimination of sharp curves, proper highway safety and international signs controlling the safety of motorists who use Michigan highways.

Kelly again appealed to the motorists public to purchase their 1940 license plates at the earliest possible date, in convenient places, and nerves will be avoided by applying for plates early in the day, thereby avoiding the rush hours.

Mrs. Maurice Seebald of Edward Avenue is spending some time with her sister, Mrs. Henry Hills of Northville.

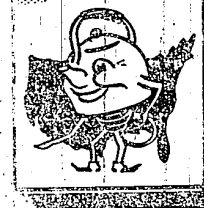

Pattengill School Has Many Fishermen

If the families of students in Pattengill Junior High School at Lansing are a fair sample, people of that region are well aware of the advantages of hunting and fishing in Michigan. Among the 1,274 students of the school, or their families, 522 fishing licenses were bought and 9,779 bluegills, 680 trout, 1,840 bass and 960 pike were caught. On 484 small game hunting licenses 445 squirrels, 161 partridge, 399 pheasants and 1,051 rabbits were taken. Of 122 who got deer licenses, 44 bagged bucks. The census was taken by members of the school's junior sportsman's club.
