Services Held Saturday For Miss Sprague

Funeral services for Miss Katherine Sprague, who died February 24, were held Saturday at two o'clock at the home of her sister, Mrs. C. W. Huber, with whom she had made her home for the past 22 years.

Miss Sprague was the daughter of the late Lorenzo and Laura Sprague. Lifetime residents of Farmington, she was born December 26, 1851. At the age of 15 she became a student at the State Normal College at Ypsilanti. After graduation she taught seven years at Jackson, and then entered the University of Michigan. She was graduated with a B. A. degree, and accepted a position at Wilcox Normal College in Minnesota, teaching mathematics and languages a position which she held for 35 years.

Miss Sprague was endowed with a remarkable mind, a most retentive memory, the ability to absorb knowledge and to store and best of all, the power to apply her stores of learning, to the betterment and happiness of all who came in contact with her, whether pupil or friend.

She traveled widely—a trip around the world, a visit to Alaska, and to Mexico, and several visits to Europe and the British Isles. Not as a casual tourist, but as one always seeking to absorb the cultures and peoples of these countries could give her.

She was a valued member of the Farmington Woman's Club, and contributed generously of her talents to its programs.

The last few years of her life were years of affliction, losing both her sight and hearing, which she bore uncomplainingly. Her philosophy of life, and belief in its eternal verities may be summed up in the following stanza, from Tennyson's "In Memoriam," which was quoted by Dr. Sydney D. Ewa, the officiating clergyman.

"That God, Who ever lives and loves,
One God, one law, one element,
And one, far off divine event,
To which the whole creation moves."
