The subject of the lecture will be, "Christian Science: True Education."

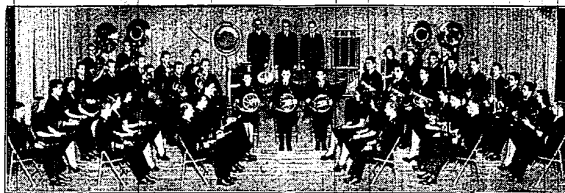

LOAD RESTRICTION PLACED ON GRAND RIVER AVENUE

Load limit restrictions this week were in force on Grand River and all other state trunkline highways in Michigan.

State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wageningen ordered load limit enforcement to protect roads from being pounded by overweighted trucks during a period of spring thaws. Limits will remain in force until road beds have drained and hardened for normal travel.

The late break-up caused severe cutting of some sections of gravel road in the state. A barricade of M-94, from Deerton to US-41, in Marquette County, was ordered to protect the surface of that road, now under construction from heavy trucking operations.

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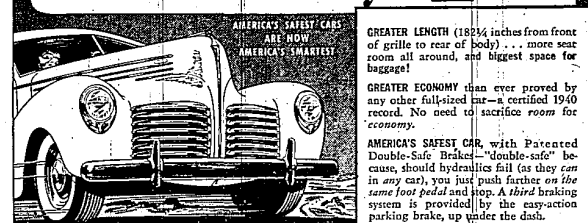
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
