A 'Realist' of Another Day

In these days of unrestrained "either as exemplified in 'Grain and Wheat' and 'Tobacco Road,' it would appear to be absurd exaggeration to call Hamlin Garland—the subject of extended comment in an adjacent column—a realist. Yet so he was denominated when he began to stave the world his vivid, new pictures of pioneering in Wisconsin and the Dakotas, just before the turn of the century. And he underwent severe criticism for his daring—for this was the day of the romanticists and the Major's and the Catherine's and the Robert W. Chambers's and the George Barr McCutcheon's dominated the literary scene. Garland put his barefooted heroines in out-of-date calico dresses and perished his sockless, calloused heroes to sweat (and woe!) there would be no one to believe that he told his tales too convincingly because he refrained from the use of language which no respectable publisher of a generation ago would have dared to print.

SURVEY SHOWS REMODELING WILL PAY FOR ITSELF

SIX SCHOOLS IN LOWER STATE GET MILK TESTERS

Six schools to serve all the cow tasters in the Lower Peninsula are scheduled by the dairy extension service of Michigan State College.

First of the noon to noon schools is to be at Kalamazoo, April 22 to the end of the next day in the office of the county agricultural agent in Kalamazoo and Otsego County.

April 23, to noon of April 24, the testers in another section of the state will be in conference in the postoffice building at Jackson.

The conference center for all other section of counties will be Lapeer, from noon of April 24 to noon of April 25; Saginaw, noon of April 25 to noon of April 26. Concluding conferences are to be in Grand Rapids, noon of May 1 to noon of May 2, and Cadillac, noon of May 2 to noon of May 3.

A. C. Baltzer, college extension dairyman, has arranged to have three other college men on the programs. These are C. M. Harrison, pasture specialist, J. M. Jensen, dairy specialist on milk and cream quality, and E. C. Scheldt, dairy specialist.

Conferences are designed to equip testers with information that will help dairyman produce with less expense and yet assure public of quality product. Another phase will emphasize technique by individual testers and still another to make the testing records more valuable by proper interpretation and better percentage of completion.

When a cheese dish comes out of the oven or off the stove with a stringy appearance, the cooking heat has been too high.

So the natural remedy, home economists staff members at Michigan State College suggest, is to cook cheese dishes at a lower heat.

A low temperature for cooking cheese is the best way to keep it tender and to blend it well with the other ingredients. In fact, cheese should not really be "cooked," but merely heated enough to melt it. Overheating toughens the protein of the cheese and makes it stringy.

When using cheese in a baked dish, such as scalloped vegetables or meatloaf and cheese, it is best to melt the cheese in the space before it is mixed with the other ingredients. But be sure to take the sauce off the fire first and to melt the cheese without overheating it.

When cheese sandwiches are toasted under a broiler flame, the bread insulates the cheese against too much heat. If the sandwich is the open-face variety it is especially important to have a very low flame.

Another rule for making successful cheese dishes is to break the cheese into small pieces before heating. Then it will spread more evenly among the other ingredients, and it will melt in less time. Grating is the easiest way to break up the cheese if it is fairly dry. Otherwise, flake it with a fork or shave it thin.

When the cheese is to be melted in a sauce it may be grated, flaked, or shaved. But when cheese is mixed in a batter or dough—as for muffins, bread, or biscuits—it must be grated first. These fine particles will be mixed thoroughly with the dry ingredients; the cheese will not cling together nor form into hard lumps.
