CITY VOTES TO BORROW \$8,000 FOR NEW BUILDING

At a special meeting held Monday night, the City Commission voted to borrow \$8,000 for the purpose of purchasing the Peoples State Bank building for use as a city office building.

It was voted to borrow for current expenses in anticipation of the collection of delinquent taxes, and to set up 40 per cent or more of the delinquent taxes collected in a sinking fund to retire the loan.

The money will be borrowed on notes and will be payable as follows:

August 1, 1941, \$1,000.00; August 1, 1942, \$1,000.00; August 1, 1943, \$1,000.00; August 1, 1944, \$2,000.00. Interest will be paid at the rate of four per cent per annum.

All city offices, including the clerk's, the treasurer's, and the deputy sheriff's, will be moved into the new quarters. Minor repairs will be necessary before the building is used.
