Heralded as Deanna Durbin's most colorful motion picture, "It's a Date," which has its background in Hawaii, will open Friday at the Redford Theater.

Marking another important forward step in the development of the Universal star into more mature roles, Deanna's seventh film finds her surrounded by a stellar cast.

Important Names
Kay Francis and Walter Pidgeon share major honors; Eugene Pallette, Lewis Howard of "First Love," Samuel S. Hinds, Cissie Loftus, Fritz Feld, S. Z. Henry, famous European actor, Stephenson, are others.

The producer responsible for Deanna's record of six consecutive hits, Joe Pasternak, assumes the same post for "It's a Date." William Selter is Deanna's new director and Norman Krassa also joins the hit-making crew as the writer. The story concerns a famous Broadway actress and her daughter, played by Miss Francis and Miss Durbin, who are offered the same role in a Broadway show. In addition they become rivals for the romantic interest of a Hawaiian pineapple planter, portrayed by Pidgeon.

Newcomer Featured
Deanna's boy-friend, played by Howard, also figures prominently in the complicated but ingratiating proceedings. The singing star has four numbers, including a popular tune,

EXPERTS GIVE HINTS ON CARE OF ROSE BUSHES

Roses will be no deeper red in color, than the necks of angry gardeners if insects get the upper hand this summer.

To aid gardeners in Oakland county, hints have been outlined by C. E. Widon, horticulturist, and Professor E. I. McDaniel, of the entomology department at Michigan State College.

Continued wet weather, says Widon, likely will induce mildew. Any plant mildew, including that which often attacks phlox, can be controlled with sulphur, dusted or sprayed on the plants and renewed if washed off.

Then there are the insects. Reports from near Detroit have indicated a new Japanese beetle scare, but Professor McDaniel finds that the prevalent bug is the rose chafers, larger in size and different in appearance. In fact the Japanese beetle, if the pest appears in any new areas outside of Detroit this year, will not emerge until after the rose chafers have gone back into hiding.

The chafers is difficult to control. In small rose gardens, hand picking is suggested, or the use of a cheesecloth tent. Using lead arsenate application over an entire yard at about five pounds to the hundred square feet provides protection for about four years.

Another rose pest due is the rose slug, a tender green pest that skeletonizes leaves. Almost any contact or stomach poison will control this pest, with another application for the second brood about August.

EVEN PLANTS GET "TOO FAT"

Several of Michigan's most important crops include plants whose ability to withstand winter weather seems to depend on their condition. In fact, men in the farm crops department at Michigan State College compare this to the tests given by life insurance companies for selection of the best insurance risks. S. T. Dexter considers that overwintering of such plants as alfalfa, sugar beets intended for seed, winter wheat and chickery is more successful if the plants are healthy, neither too luxuriant or too spindly, but just medium and in good condition.
