RELEASE PARTRIDGES

Releases of 75 young Hungarian partridge in coverts near them and of 90 adult birds near DeWitt by the conservation department's game division are the season's first stocking with hunks, reared at the Mason game farm. In April 1935 of the gray partridges, imported from Alberta, Canada, where they were trapped from wild stock, were planted near St. Johns.

From 1925 to 1940, more than 2,200 hunks have been released in likely southern Michigan locations in a program designed to establish this game bird where hunting pressure is high and increasing.

Wage, Hour Division Checks Child Labor

Inspectors of the Wage and Hour Division, U. S. Department of Labor, have been instructed by John J. Brauner, Assistant Regional Director, 346 Federal Building, Detroit, to check thoroughly every case they work on for child labor violations.

These instructions were issued to inspectors simultaneously with the announcement by Mr. Brauner that a consent decree had been signed and an injunction issued against a Jackson, Michigan junk

dealer after a routine inspection revealed violations of the child labor provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act.

The injunction, consented to by the head of the company, and signed by Federal Judge Ernest A. O'Brien in Detroit, permanently enjoined Sam's Iron and Metal Company, Inc., 528 North Jackson Street, Jackson, Mich., from further violating the Wage and Hour law.

The inspection revealed, according to the complaint, two minors under eighteen years were employed as drivers and helpers on motor vehicles. These two minors, and nine other employees of the junk yard, were not listed on the company's payroll, according to information uncovered by the division inspectors. The violations, the complaint stated, dated back to the effective date of the act, October 23, 1938.

The firm deals in scrap metal, waste paper and rags and the complaint lists Samuel Lazebnik as the president and treasurer of the company.

The Fair Labor Standards Act fixes the minimum wage at 30 cents an hour with time, and a half for all hours worked in excess of 42 hours per workweek.

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Sneezes Spell Trouble In Man or Pullet

Swollen eyes, runny nose and sneezes.

Those spell colds, whether in humans or poultry. In the case of poultry, says Dr. E. S. Walsner, extension pathologist at Michigan State College, wise treatment will pay eggs and dollars.

Colds will delay pullet development to mean few or even no fall eggs, but prices usually are the best of the year.

Proper ventilation without drafts is essential. According to Dr. Walsner, poultry requires from six to ten times the change of air needed for other types of farm animals. Each poultry house is an individual problem in ventilation.

Overcrowding should be avoided. Four square feet of floor space should be permitted each bird when mature.

Another poultry problem is to provide segregation for sick birds, thus cutting down the chance of further contamination among the still healthy flock members. Diseased birds refusing to eat need an

appetizer. A warm moist mash will help and ample supplies of feed with vitamins A and D are considered essential.

Mechanics thus are the main pointers. Those controls that involve medicine, asserts Dr. Walsner, ought to be applied with the aid of a properly qualified person such as a local licensed veterinarian.

Some benefits are credited to using dry chemical powders, using a hand operated dust gun and also using the powder in drinking water to slow up spread of infection.
