Employment Service Notes Drop in Jobs

A drop of 7.1 per cent in the number of jobs filled in private industry by the Michigan State Employment Service last week was seen in report of activities issued by Harry A. McDonald, Chairman of the Unemployment Compensation Commission.

The Employment Service, job finding, division of the Commission, filled a total of 2,505 jobs in private industry during the week. Jobs were also found for 221 other unemployed workers in required public projects, making a total of 2,726 for the week.

McDonald reported that the private placements for the week, although below the previous week's total, were still 13 per cent above those made by the Employment Service during the comparable week in 1939.

He also drew attention to the fact that 3,571 new applications for work from Michigan's jobless had been received from those who had never before used the service. This figure is 7.4 per cent below that of the previous week, and 17.1 per cent below the total for the same week in 1939.

"While there has been a decrease of seven per cent in the number of workers using our service to find employment," McDonald pointed out, "we still have 231,705 unemployed workers in the active file."

"This furnishes employers with a reservoir of highly skilled and capable workers to meet any demand which may be made on Michigan industry by the nation's defense program."

"Employers are invited to use the service."

State Cans 64 Million Pounds of Cherries

With the cherry canning season coming to a close last week, officials of the Michigan Canners Association this week informed Agricultural Commissioner Elmer A. Beamer that this year's pack totaled approximately 59,000,000 pounds of sour cherries and 5,000,000 pounds of sweets.

Beamer stated that of this amount approximately 10,000,000 pounds were inspected by the federal-state fruit and vegetable inspection service, which is available to canners who wish to contract for it.

With the pack almost as large as last year when about 61,000,000 pounds were canned, growers received about 1/2 cent a pound more for their cherries this year.

The most notable development in the Michigan cherry industry in recent years is the great increase in the processing of maraschino cherries. Information received from packers show that the processing of Michigan sweet cherries into maraschino cherries has increased 50% in the last five years.


