Wins National Vail Medal Award As Memorial Observes 20th Year



Furn W. Underwood, sponsor's helper, Southern California Telephone Company, Santa Ana, Calif., received a silver Vail medal from the national committee of award for rescuing a power company lineman, who had been shocked and burned by high voltage circuit, from a pole during a severe storm, in the 20 years since the establishment of the Vail Memorial Fund. 11 gold and 88 silver medals have been awarded by the national committee.

"For prompt action, courage and resourcefulness, under hazardous conditions, which resulted in the probable saving of a human life," Furn W. Underwood, a telephone sponsor's helper, has won national recognition by the Theodore N. Vail Memorial Fund.

Underwood, an employee at Santa Ana, Calif., received a silver medal and \$250 cash by order of the National Committee of the Fund, for noteworthy public service in 1939. He rescued a power company lineman, severely shocked and burned by high-voltage circuit, from high on a 50-foot pole during a severe storm at Newport Beach, Calif.

While at work with a splicer on a telephone cable, Underwood was informed that two men on a pole three blocks away were in trouble. With climbing equipment, rubber boots and a hand line, Underwood hastened to their assistance. He found that one man, unconscious,
