## DEVRIENDT ISSUES WARNING AGAINST CHECK FORGER

Residents of Farmington Township and the City of Farmington are warned by Deputy Joseph DeVriendt to be on the lookout for a man who has been passing bad checks in this locality. The man poses as a representative of the Gallup Poll system. DeVriendt said, asking questions of residents, usually farmers. After securing the name and address of several victims, the man frequently forces the names onto worthless checks.

He is described as being about fifty years old, five feet eight inches tall, and of medium build. One hand is described as being considerably smaller than the other.

The man is sought by police of this and neighboring communities. He has passed worthless checks in South Lyon, Novi, and Farmington. DeVriendt said. Anyone seeing a person answering his description is asked to get in touch with the Deputy Sheriff's office immediately.
