PARENT EDUCATION GROUP TO MEET AT ANN ARBOR

Hundreds of Michigan parents will attend the eleventh annual Parent Education Institute to be held at the University of Michigan, Oct. 30, 31 and Nov. 1.

Citizenship will be the theme of the institute which is sponsored by the Michigan Congress of Parents and Teachers and the University's Extension Service.

Citizenship in the school, home, and in the community will be discussed during the three day session. Classes in parent education will meet each morning with Mrs. H. S. Mallory, lecturer and consultant in family relations, as instructor.

M. S. MacLean, President of Hampton Institute, Hampton, Virginia, will give the institute's opening address, "The School as a Training Ground for Citizenship." "Like Bad Boys" will be the subject of the Oct. 30 noonday luncheon speech by Judge J. M. Braude, of the Chicago Boys Court.

Fourteen community demonstrations of citizenship in action will be reviewed at the afternoon meeting, Nov. 1. Among the projects to be described are: the Cass Avenue Methodist Church project in Detroit, the Midland Community Center, the tool library of the Chrysler Motor Corporation, the Kalamazoo community dances, the Four-H Clubs, the Youth Hostels, and the Beaverton Rural Agricultural School.

SPANISH COURSES BECOME POPULAR AT ANN ARBOR

Popular interest in the nation's good neighbor policy toward Latin American republics is indicated in greatly increased enrollment in elementary Spanish courses at the University of Michigan, according to Professor Hayward Keniston, chairman of the University's romance languages department.

Professor Keniston likens this growth of interest in the Spanish tongue to a similar growth during the world war, when commercial activity of United States firms in South and Central America was increasing rapidly and Americans foresaw opportunities to use the language in business.

The present increase in the study of Spanish, Professor Keniston believes, is due not so much to the commercial factor as to the greater realization of the importance of Latin America politically and culturally to the future of the United States.

Added impetus to this increased interest in Spanish is given by the policies of the federal government, by the activities of private philanthropic organizations, and by national magazines issuing editions in Spanish. All of these

states are contributing greatly to agencies, Professor Keniston better understanding between our southern neighbors and ourselves.

Corresponding decreases in the study of languages of those countries now involved in the European war have been noted. Professor Keniston says, gains in enrollment in Spanish courses, he points out, are almost offset by lowered enrollment in the other European languages.

Similar trends have been observed, says Professor Keniston, in other universities and colleges throughout the United States, as the importance of the Latin American republics gain increased recognition on the part of citizens of the United States.

ENROLLMENT AT U. OF M. REACHES 10,908 FOR SEMESTER

University of Michigan enrollment for the first semester of the new school year stood at 10,908 at the end of the first day of classes recently.

University officials expressed satisfaction with the new enrollment figure, which is only 70 students, or six-tenths of one per cent, below the record-breaking enrollment of 10,978 at the corresponding date of last year. Last year's enrollment reached 12,132 before the first semester closed.

Four of the University's schools and colleges showed increases this year, while the other nine experienced slight decreases. The largest numerical decrease was in the College of Engineering, with 74 fewer students than last year. This represents a loss of only 3.5 per cent of the College's total enrollment, however.

The new enrollment figure consists of 7,761 men and 3,147 women. Last year at the same time, 7,916 men and 3,062 women students were enrolled.

The Michigan enrollment is considered satisfactory when compared with registrations in other colleges and universities throughout the country this fall. A general tendency toward smaller enrollments everywhere is attributed by University authorities to the uncertainties of the world situation and increased employment opportunities in this country.

NOTED ARTIST TO APPEAR AT TOWN HALL

One of the most colorful figures in American art will be the Town Hall speaker in the Fisher Theatre next Wednesday, October 30, at 11 a. m. He is McClelland Barclay, noted illustrator, portrait painter, and originator of the "Fisher Body Girl". This artist's magazine covers and illustrations are famous the world over and have literally molded American standards of feminine charm.

Mr. Barclay will make sketches on the stage to illustrate his talk, "An Artist Looks at Life and Art."

An expert in camouflage, Barclay will soon embark on a government mission to study new problems in this field. During the first World War he performed important war service as a camouflage expert for the Navy, originating new and highly effective camouflage schemes for battle-ships. He is equally famous for his war posters.

He is widely acclaimed in art circles for his portraits of celebrities, and in industrial fields for his designs for such utilitarian products as telephone books, book ends, ash trays and radio stands. He is the first artist of note to adapt his knowledge of painting and sculpture to industrial design.

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ORANGE AND APPLE CRATES MAY BE USED FOR TOYS

Orange crates and apple boxes will be used in Michigan by many families to follow the suggestions of the home economics department at Michigan State College.

In a comprehensive study of "homemade toys and play equipment" reported in a new bulletin with that title, Michigan Extension Bulletin 216, the use of inexpensive materials is stressed as a wise combination with such purchased articles as wagons, doll carriages, dolls, trains, boats and toy automobiles, bicycles, tricycles and roller skates and sleds.

From orange crates the bulletin describes simple construction of a toy cupboard, an orange crate chair, settee and small wardrobe.

Apple boxes become a chest of drawers and a packing case is converted into a small table in the bulletin.

Every living room ought to have at least one chair to fit each child. A place to put toys makes discipline more effective.

Three types of toys described by the bulletin include:

1. Activity toys which involve use of large muscles: wagons, tricycles, kiddie cars, wheel barrows, climbing ladders, treckers, swings, hoes, boards and balls.

2. Imitative and dramatic toys: dolls, animals, trains, boats, toy automobiles, household equipment and costume materials.

3. Creative play materials: blocks, clay, paint, paper, scissors, tools, wood, sand, cloth and sewing materials.

MICHIGAN COWS TOP U.S. AVERAGE OF PRODUCTION

If production is part of defense, Michigan dairy cows are highly patriotic, for they are far above the average in the United States.

Similarly says A. C. Baltzer, dairy extension specialist on the staff of Michigan State College, the animals enrolled in cow testing under the \$7 dairy herd improvement associations in the state are also far above the average Michigan cow.

Here are some of the most recent figures:

The average cow in dairy herd improvement associations in the state is producing at the annual rate of 8,150 pounds of milk containing 337 pounds of butterfat. The average of all Michigan's 915,000 dairy cows is producing at the annual rate of 5,200 pounds of milk and 198 pounds of butterfat. For the United States the average cow's yearly output is 4,538 pounds of milk and 179 pounds of butterfat.

There's economy in this Michigan milk production, too. It is pointed out by Baltzer. Feed cost for a Michigan D.H.I.A. cow is \$27 a year for the average Michigan cow, \$45 for the nation's average, \$48.

To project this average picture further, the feed cost is used as 41 per cent of the cost of producing milk. This indicates a Michigan D.H.I.A. can produce milk at a total cost of \$1.68 a hundred after including feed, labor, management, buildings and equipment and depreciation. For the average Michigan cow the production cost seems to be \$2.69 a hundred and for the average U.S. cow it is \$2.60. Consumers can interpret these farm costs by remembering there are about 46 quarts in a hundred pounds of milk.

Superhighway Planned North of Detroit

State Highway Commissioner Murray D. Van Wagener this week ordered a survey started for a super-highway planned to connect Stephenson highway with Conant and Dequindre streets in Detroit.

Van Wagener stated the proposed highway would provide an easier route into Detroit for persons residing north of Royal Oak and would relieve congested conditions on several present thoroughfares.

It was explained a right-of-way would be acquired to provide for a divided super-highway and that the two concrete traffic lanes would be divided by a parkway.

The highway, to be located in the vicinity of the Eight Mile Road on the outskirts of Royal Oak, will extend for approximately eight miles and will be continued north to connect with M-150 at Big Beaver.

Immediately following completion of the survey, Van Wagener stated plans would be speeded to permit work to be started at the earliest possible moment.

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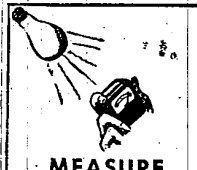
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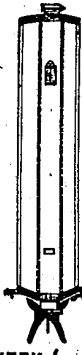
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
