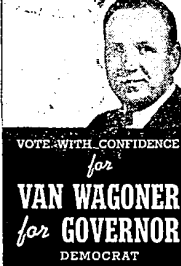

U. OF M. MAN TO BE SPEAKER AT MEETING HERE

Wallace Watt, of the Child Guidance Institute of the University of Michigan, will be the speaker at a dinner meeting of the district teachers' association Monday evening. Mr. Watt's topic will be "Counsel and Guidance." The meeting will be held in the Farmington high school gymnasium and will start at 8 p. m.

Superintendent O. E. Dunckel attended a meeting of the superintendents of schools in this senatorial district Thursday noon in Birmingham. A discussion was held on the problem of state finance legislation.

On Thursday evening the regular monthly meeting of superintendents of the Southwestern Oakland County League was held at Clarkston. This association included Farmington, Clarenceville, John Grace, and a number of rural schools in this vicinity.

On Saturday Mr. Dunckel plans to attend the institute on Problems of Taxation, to be held at the University of Michigan. The institute is directed by Robert S. Ford, associate professor of Economics and director of the Bureau of Government at the university.

The speaker will be Rep. F. Jack Neller, of Battle Creek, who will talk on "The Creation of Revenue and Finance."

Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, state superintendent of instruction, will be present. Earl Babcock, superintendent at Grand Haven, will present a discussion "As Small School See It," and John P. Thomas, deputy superintendent of Detroit schools, will talk on "As The Large School Sees It." John Reid, secretary-treasurer of the Michigan Federation of Labor, will discuss the situation "As Labor Sees It."

Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Everett of Lake Orion were the week end guests of the latter's sister, Miss Zaida Steele.

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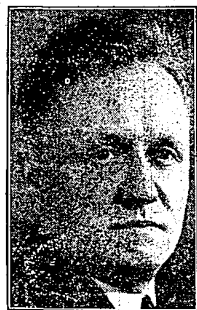
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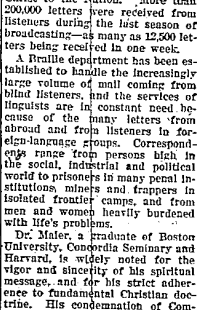
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
