STATEMENT



Edmond J. Donohue, candidate for Probate Judge, is a practicing attorney in Pontiac, Justice of the Peace in West Bloomfield Township, and a member of the Township Board. He was active in the recent Citizenship Day program. He is an active member of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Oakland County Bar Association, and the Michigan State Bar Association. He was born in Pontiac and has lived in Oakland County most of his life. He is a graduate of the University of Detroit, and the Detroit College of Law.

In announcing his candidacy, and program, he states, "The office of Probate Judge should be handled on a full time basis. Oakland County has the second largest population, among the counties, in the State, and in view of the many matters of vital importance handled by this Court, it is the duty of the Probate Judge to devote all of his time to the administration of this office, and to refrain from the private practice of law.

"The public has the right to expect the man they elect to give his exclusive services to the office of Probate Judge, and not divide his time between this important post and various other business connections. Many matters require immediate attention which can only be given if one is on the job at all times.

"Prompt handling in the matter of decisions will result in an appreciable savings of time for attorneys and litigants, and accelerate the Probate Court calendar."

Mr. Donohue has been endorsed by Labor's Non-Partisan League of the State of Michigan and by the Congress of Industrial Organizations for Oakland County.
