For General Primary Election To Be Held Monday, February 17, 1941
To the qualified electors of the City of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan
Notice is hereby given that in conformity with the Michigan Election Law, I, the undersigned City Clerk, will upon any day, except Sunday and a legal holiday, the day of any regular or special or primary election, receive for Registration the name of any legal voter in said City not already registered who may apply to me personally for such registration, provided however, that I can receive no name for registration during the time intervening between the second Saturday before any regular, special or official election and the date of such election.

To Finish Mapping of Michigan in 10 years

Finishing within 10 years of the long delayed job of completing the mapping of Michigan, at a cost to the state of \$55,000 a year, will engage the early attention of 1941 legislators.
The southern half of the lower peninsula, already 65 percent mapped, can be completed at the rate of \$2.50 a square mile, and planimetric mapping by air of 11,000 square miles in the upper peninsula and 15,000 square miles in the lower peninsula will cost an estimated \$22.50 a square mile.
The United States Geological Survey directs the actual surveying, pays half the cost.
For many years the state's share of the cost of this mapping,

which has been carried on intermittently and sometimes on a small scale, has been borne entirely by the geological survey of the conservation department and by the highway department, though practically all state agencies use the maps.

CCC Enrollment Fills State's 45 Camps

Enrollment of 3,500 Michigan youths 17 to 23 years of age to bring to full strength the force that mans the state's 45 CCC camps begins this week. Young men enroll for six months, may spend as much as two years in the camps where training in some 30 trades is furnished.
Reforestation of 425,000 acres since 1933 in Michigan has been

the biggest CCC reforestation job in the nation. Nearly one-fourth of the 80 million dollars spent in CCC activity in the state has gone back to parents in allotments from enrollees' pay.
