MAY FESTIVAL TO OPEN MAY 7 AT ANN ARBOR

The University Musical Society has made elaborate plans for the First-Eighth Annual May Festival which will take place in Hill Auditorium, Ann Arbor, May 7, 8, 9 and 10. As usual, six concerts will be given - four evening performances and two matinees. Charles A. Slink, President of the Society, announces that four new vocal stars will be heard for the first time: Jarmila Novotna, distinguished Czechoslovakian operatic soprano; Suzanne Sten, Hungarian-Viennese mezzo-soprano, star of many European opera houses; Charles Kullman, tenor; and Mack Harrell, baritone.

American stars of the Metropolitan, who have made outstanding records in European opera companies.

Special favorites of previous Festivals will include Dorothy Maynor, Negro soprano, who will appear in the traditionally brilliant Friday night program; Enid Sazanho, Irish-Hungarian contralto of European opera fame, as well as the Metropolitan; Norman Cordon, versatile American bass of the Metropolitan Opera Company; and Lawrence Tibbett, America's stellar baritone of the Metropolitan, radio and recital fame, who will be the star of the first night.

Gregor Platigorsky, Russian violinist, will appear Thursday night in Strauss' monumental "Don Quixote" violincello concerto. Jascha Heifetz will play Shubert's violin concerto in an all-Sibelius program Saturday afternoon; while Jose Iturbi, as piano soloist Friday afternoon, will also conduct the orchestra from the pianoforte.

Thor Johnson will lead the University Choral Union in a presentation of a work by a well-known contemporary American composer, Randall Thompson, entitled, "Alleluia"; and Braxton "Bugs" Moran will lead the Thursday evening program, with Jarmila Novotna and Mr. Cordon as soloists.

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At the beginning of 1940, there were 1,359,417 telephones in service throughout the Dominion of Canada, an increase of 35,223, or 2.8 per cent during the preceding year.

During the forty years since the beginning of this century, the world's population has increased about 35 per cent, whereas the total number of telephones in the world has increased more than 2,000 per cent to over 42,000,000, or more than 2,000 per cent.

Forty years ago, more than half of the Bell Telephone System's wire mileage was in open wire and about 15% in aerial cable. Grouse Increase in Upper Peninsula

Sharptailed grouse are now more numerous than prairie chickens in the upper-peninsula, in the opinion of George A. Ammann of the conservation department's game division.

The change in abundance in favor of the sharptail, a newcomer to most parts of the peninsula in the last twenty years, is rated "relatively rapid." A check of last season's bird hunting about the straits shows a lower prairie chicken kill and a higher sharptailed grouse kill in 1940 than in the year before.

Ammann reports.

Ammann, now at Cusino wildlife experiment station, is investigating these game birds under the Pittman-Robertson program in which federal and state governments cooperate.

Under conditions of wartime emergency, American production of all fisheries products could be increased 46 per cent, including an increase in food fish production of 86 per cent, according to estimates of the federal Fish and Wildlife Service.
