Fruit Growers Advised To Remove Old Trees

Farmers are advised to start a defense program against serious insects and diseases which are likely to be prevalent in neglected and abandoned orchards. The tremendous losses caused by insect pests and plant diseases cannot be ignored, and will assuredly assume serious proportions if effective methods of control are not employed. The control methods rest largely with the farmers whose property is to be protected.

Commissioner Decker calls attention to the fact that neglected or abandoned trees, vines, shrubs and plants constitute a menace to the horticulture or agriculture of the state, because they provide a favorable and likely harbor for injurious or destructive insect pests or plant diseases.

Police Protection is Offered by Concern An offer to provide a 24-hour police service for Farmington residents was made this week by the Michigan Patrol, a concern operated by Fred Roth and C. Stevens. Under the proposed system police service would be provided to patrons upon payment of a monthly fee.

Measles Epidemic Under Way in Michigan Measles cases reported to the Michigan Department of Health in January totaled 6,387, double the December total.

"The epidemic of measles expected of this winter is under way, and parents should do everything they can to protect babies and very young children against contact with anyone who has the disease," said Dr. H. Allen Meyer. "If the date of exposure is known, treatment can be given by the physician up to the eighth day after exposure which will prevent or lighten the attack."

The measles cases reported in January this year are twice as many as occurred in the first month of the 1938 epidemic and five times as many as in January of the 1935 epidemic. Both those epidemics reached 30,000 cases, with March, April and May the biggest months.
