WILMER E. MOODY TO DIRECT COUNTY HOSPITAL DRIVE

Wilmer E. Moody, assistant general chairman of the St. Joseph Mercy Hospital Expansion Fund Drive, has been selected to take the reins of the Fund Drive, by Mr. Henry Scripps Booth, general chairman, during the latter's enforced absence from the city.

Mr. Moody, for years one of the civic leaders in Birmingham and production executive for the General Motors Truck Corporation of Pontiac, outlined plans for the completion of the Drive and soliciting the remainder of the prospects by Drive Solicitors.

"We are going to take the time necessary to complete this task, and the response to our appeal thus far indicates that the remainder of the people not yet seen will be proportionately generous in their gifts," announced Mr. Moody.

"We are not asking for a gift for a temporary cause, but a permanent investment which will serve the entire county for many years to come. It is unfortunate that this critical situation demands immediate action at a time when we cannot wait any longer, but the necessity for meeting this need at once is persuasive enough to cause us all to give it priority," he added.

"None of us ever knew in advance when we will need the very facilities which we are creating; but one thing is certain there are many thousands in this community who will need it during the coming twelve months. We cannot temporize with vital services of this nature. These things we must provide."
